Cottonmouth Moccasin
The cottonmouth moccasin is a dangerously poisonous snake generally of dark chestnut-brown with some darker barring and with yellowish-white stripes on the head and throat. The common name of this snake refers to the white lining of the mouth, which it is said to display before biting. Cottonmouths may attain a length of four feet. They are not aggressive and most cases of snake bite in which they are involved are due to the reptiles being stepped on.

Experiments conducted all over the United States give ample evidence of the fact that corn cultivation is used for the purpose of controlling weeds only and throws into the discard the idea that working the ground preserves moisture states county agent J. J. Inskeep.

Many of the best corn growers in Clackamas county cultivate only when it is absolutely necessary from the weed control standpoint. These same growers dislike to cultivate more than twice during the growing season and consider damage to the roots appearing at time of cultivation counteracts the benefits for the small number of weeds destroyed.

Shallow and infrequent cultivation is to be desired. This matter of infrequent cultivation is of special importance in Clackamas county where summer rains are infrequent.

The flax fields of the southern portion of Clackamas county are suffering serious damage from cnephasia longana which is the same insect that attacks strawberries, hops and many other field crops in the county according to county agent Inskeep.

Although the damage suffered is rather extensive no practical means of control have yet been advised. Cnephasia longana is an extensive feeder using many field crops and weeds which accounts for the difficulty in its control. Infested flax plants show damage at the tip where the worm spins a web and feeds on the fresh growth.
