## War Vets Prepare for Emergency

Every ex-service man in the Estacada community is urged to attend a meeting to be held in the American Legion hall at Estacada next Monday evening, May 26 at which time organization will be perfected of a disaster relief committee and guard and patrol platoons.

Inasmuch as ex-service men are better fitted thru previous military experience to carry out disaster relief and guard work they are being asked to augment the civil police authorities in case of emergency.

In case of disaster the men of the local guard and patrol platoons will immediately take over until such time as the civil police authorities can take care of the situation.

S. E. Lawrence, local Legion commander, F. E. Dooley post adjutant and Grover Kiggins have been attending school at police headquarters in Portland and will be able to give first hand instructions on methods to be used in this work.

It should be clearly understood the local guard and patrol members will not be used in labor troubles.

## MAYOR PROCLAIMS POPPY DAY MAY 24TH

Saturday, May 24 was proclaimed as Poppy Day in Estacada in a proclamation issued today by Mayor Wooster. The Mayor called upon all citizens to observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy of the American Legion and auxiliary.

The proclamation stated: "Whereas, the wearing of the memorial poppy is a fitting and effective way of keeping bright the memory of those young men who gave their lives in America's service in the World War and

Whereas, men of Estacada served gallantly in that war, some being called upon to sacrifice their lives in that service, and

Whereas, the present national emergency requires the same type of unselfish patriotism displayed by the men and symbolized by their memorial flower, and

Whereas, the women of the American Legion auxiliary will distribute veteran-made memorial poppies thru-out the city on Saturday, May 24,

Now, therefore I, S. E. Wooster, Mayor of the City of Estacada, do proclaim Saturday, May 24, to be Poppy day in the City of Estacada and urge all citizens to observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy of the American Legion and American Legion auxiliary in honor of the men who died for America in the war of 1917 and 1918.

Poles of the 56-mile distribution line of the Northeast Clackamas Electric Co-op, Inc., have nearly all been placed in the Bjornstedt road community. This week the contractors, Wayman and Huerngard of Portland will move their crew to the Dover district, Sandy Heights already has its poles but no wire stringing has been started. Between 50 and 60 men of the rural homes in the district to be served by the power co-op have been wired for electricity. The project is being financed thru an R. E. A. loan of \$66,000.

## Methodist Camp on Deep Creek

A large delegation of Portland Methodists last Sunday joined a caravan to the site of the proposed Methodist retreat camp on the Sandy-Eagle Creek highway.

The 80-acre tract is about midway between the two communities and at a point where the highway crosses Deep Creek. Much of the cleared portion of the tract is visible from the roadway as the highway bisects the property.

The way in which Deep Creek runs thru the tract makes possible the construction of two independent camps so that more than one group might use the property at the same time.

The option of the site must be exercised within two weeks according to Dr. Milton A. Marcy district superintendent who has approved the undertaking. The young people are in a campaign to raise \$2000 before June 1 to pay for the property and another \$2000 soon thereafter to improve it.

### CONTRACT GIVEN FOR CROSSING AT CLACKAMAS

A contract for construction of an over head crossing on the 82nd street highway at Clackamas including grading, paving and construction of two timber bridges has been awarded to Roy L. Houck of Salem for \$97,016 the state highway commission announced recently.

This project is located a short distance north of Clackamas and will go over the Southern Pacific tracks.

Babler Bros., contractors of Oregon City and Portland received a \$127,418 contract from the state for grading and surfacing .95 mile of the Vollmer creek and Necanicum junction of the Wolf Creek highway and one for \$7025 for placing pier protection for the swing span pier for the bridge over the Wilamette river at Corvallis.
