

In the Pacific a fleet would probably be based at Singapore to keep an eye on Japan. American naval officials think relatively little of the Japanese navy and are certain we would have little difficulty in defend ing ourselves from Hawaii to the mainland.

A number of authorities feel that Hitler would have taken a tougher line with us long ago had it not been for the American navy, that he wants to avoid actual war with because he fears that the unlimited participation of our fleet would turn the scales igainst him.
