NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. 108, of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of the said district will be held at the Grade School on the 16th day of June, 1941 at 8:00 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of discussing the budget for the fiscal school year, beginning June 16, 1941, and ending June 17, 1942, hereinafter set forth, and to vote on the proposition of levying a district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 16, 1941 and ending June 17, 1942 is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax and all other moneys of the district.

Until the ballots are counted at least one hour after the time set for the meeting in districts of the second and third classes, any legal voter of the district shall be entitled to vote upon any matters before the meeting.
