ARMY EQUIPMENT ROLLS OFF FORD ASSEMBLY LINE

Already seen in the Pacific north west army posts are the tough little command reconnassance trucks the most spectacular of the varied motorized equipment now rolling off the production assembly lines of the Ford Motor company's Rouge plant.

This revolutionary type of military vehicle expected to play a major role in the national defense picture and army drivers are rapidly familiarizing themselves with the performance of the "blitz buggies."

The U. S. army has placed an initial \$1,387,500 order with Ford for 1,500 of the highly maneuverable and verstatile reconnaissance trucks Only recently was it recognized that Powered by a 45-h.p. four cylinder engine adapted from the Ford tractor the lightweight vehicles travel extremely rough or soft ground with plane production has been doubled of nearly a mire a minute. They are smail enough to be readily concealed in the field.

Among the pygmy truck's outstanding features are its four wheel drive and its transmissions, regular and auxiliary, which give it six speeds forward and two in reverse. In tests | 1941. ing the 20's and 30's it was given an the truck attained a speed of nearly 60 miles per hour and climbed grades at steep as 68 percent fully loaded and better than 80 percent with the iriver only.
