

### CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"SOUL AND BODY" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Church of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 25.

The Golden Text was, "I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (I Thess. 5:23).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "The Lord is the portion of mine inheritance and of my cup; thou maintainest my lot. I have set the Lord always before me; because he is at my right hand, I shall not be moved. Therefore my heart is glad, and my glory rejoiceth; my flesh also shall rest in hope" (Ps. 16:5,8,9).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "It is objected to Christian Science that it claims God as the only absolute Life and Soul, and man to be His idea,—that is, His image. It should be added that this is claimed to represent the normal, healthful, and sinless condition of man in divine Science, and that this claim is made because the Scriptures say that God has created man in His own image and after His likeness" (p.344).

### MORE BERRY PICKERS ARE NEEDED

The appeal for berry pickers thru the medium of local newspapers is having a good effect according to R. A. Blyth, manager of the Oregon state employment office for Clackamas county.

About 200 pickers have already been placed by that office. However about 600 more will be needed very soon as strawberry picking will be in full swing within a very few days if the present good weather continues. The crop is excellent and with the prevailing prices for picking now in effect pickers should realize good money for their efforts.

The employment office will refer prospective pickers to good strawberry grounds in Clackamas county immediately on calling at room 8, court house, Oregon City.
