

Large Delegation for Summer School

Clackamas county's largest delegation ever to attend 4-H club summer school will leave Oregon City and Canby Monday afternoon, June 9. One hundred three club members, four chaperones and two teachers will be among those going. The entire delegation will go to Corvallis on a special train which will arrive in Oregon City at 4:15 p.m. and at Canby at 4:30 p.m. This special train will have eastern Oregon 4-H club members aboard as well as club members from the city of Portland and Multnomah and Marion counties. Willingness of 4-H club members to help themselves and generous cooperation of various organizations over county has made it possible for this fine delegation to profit by the two weeks of organized study and play according to Edwin Keltner county club agent.

The source of scholarships for the club members are as follows: 16 from the state fair; 9 from PTA groups; 12 from granges; 12 from banks; 27 from 4-H clubs; seven paying their own way; and 18 from other organizations and individuals. This is 22 more club members than attended last year. The entire forenoon are given over to class work consisting of home economics, livestock, crops, forestry, horticulture, and wood working and other special classes. An assembly will be held each day at two o'clock and will be broadcast over KOAC.

From 9:30 to 5:30 p.m. club members will participate in organized recreation which will include swimming and baseball. Special functions by the Clackamas county group will include seven members of the Meier and Frank annual style revue and the presentation of a play written by Dorothy Winberg 4-H club member from Damascus over KOAC. The entire county delegation will also put on a candlelighting ceremony during one of the evening programs. Dorothy Smelser and Francine Sharp of Clackamas will present their state fair winning clothing demonstration. The delegation will be in charge of Edwin Keltner 4-H club agent.
