

PEACE AND THE CHURCH

It seems quite possible that when peace is finally restored to the world it will be accomplished by church leaders of this and European countries. This is indicated by the intelligent attitude toward the complicated problem of a future durable peace which is taken by the Federated council of churches in a memorandum issued to guide churches throughout this nation in the discussions on the subject. The council emphasizes that any permanent peace depends upon our government and the governments of other countries studying all proposed legislation on foreign trade with the view of determining its effect upon other nations. The memorandum urges recogni-

tion of the fact that in this shrinking world "what one nation does in relation to its raw materials, markets, immigration or money may vitally affect millions elsewhere" and that "a sovereignty system which accords the right to use economic power irresponsibly has become an anachronism no longer consistent with peace." Because of the calm, fair-minded attitude assumed by most church leaders they have proven in many cases that they can achieve agreement on issues which would violently disrupt any conference of politicians or diplomats. The possibility of the church being able to achieve a durable peace of which the governments themselves seem incapable is summed up in the federations memo with this state-

ment: "The church has actually demonstrated its capacity to function internationally which peculiarly qualifies it to contribute toward the healing of nations." **LARCH MOUNTAIN GETTING NEW TOWER** A new 100-foot steel lookout tower of the latest type is being built on Larch mountain under the direction of Homer Osborne, Zigzag CCG foreman assisted by Fred Urwyler, foreman at Camp Wyeth and a side camp for the CCCs has been established there. This tower will replace the 80 foot tower. Forest service lookouts have been trained to distinguish various types of airplanes and their work in watching fires now includes aerial obser-
