**Says New Drug Won't Work Here**

Phenothiazine, a new drug which has received wide and satisfactory use for treatment of intestinal parasite of sheep in eastern states has not proved efficient in treating Oregon sheep for the common and serious parasites found in this state according to county agent J. J. Inskeep who has just received a special report of investigations on this subject by Dr. J. N. Shaw of the Oregon experiment station.

Copy of this special report may be obtained in the extension office in Oregon City. The poor results obtained by Oregon sheepmen are due to the fact that parasites in Oregon are quite different from those in other states and are not destroyed by the same drugs.

County agent Inskeep advises that Clackamas county sheepmen consult a local veterinarian or veterinarian at the Oregon experiment station concerning the drugs to be used for sheep parasite control. Favorable publicity concerning the use of Phenothiazine in other states has caused the purchase of this material by Oregon sheepmen with disastrous results.

**VALE OF VIOLA**

The valley has been visited by numerous storms lately, storms of gentle mist and storms of several degrees of intensity. A storm that struck with sudden violence hurled branches from trees, uprooted plants, blew over bean poles and tore at tree tops till they bent under the unreal violence. Seidom has the valley been visited with such severity.

This almost daily washing from the thick rain from the clouds has left this region almost miraculously green. Splashed here and there with bright gardens, with acres of purple vetch and hedgerows bright with wild flowers and brake, it forms a vision for the painters brush. Added to this are several wild birds new to this region. The variable song of the mocking bird comes from the trees by the school but it is not a mocking bird for the bird wears a coat of yellowish green. Another bird with body and wings of black and bright yellow, with a red head darts in and out of the big cherry tree in the back yard. Another caller for a few days was what seemed to be a white kingfisher. A bird of bright blue larger than a common bluebird spent a day or two by a small pond. But these did not tarry. The white robin did not return this year. We miss her.

Now that the rains seem to have ceased we can take an inventory of the garden. The cabbage plants have more than doubled in size. The beans have reached the top of the poles and are stretching out for something more to cling to. The tomato plants have really started to grow. They stood still so long. Now they are really going places. The corn has had a hard race with the weeds and needs attention as soon as the ground dries out a little. Potatoes, squash and cucumbers are all ready to start out on new adventures. Grass and weeds by the way stand enviously by.—Z. H.

**Purchase Family Type Farms**

Clackamas county tenants, farm laborers and share croppers who wish to be considered for loans to purchase family type farms under provisions of the department of agriculture's tenant purchase plan should file applications now with the Farm security administration announces, Clive W. Cook, county FSA supervisor 11 Beaver Bldg., Oregon City.

Under the tenant purchase plan 7 farmers are purchasing farms in the county. Two or more additional loans will be made during the 1941-42 fiscal year. Applications are being taken now to give all eligible farm families in the county the opportunity to have their qualifications reviewed and allow sufficient time to select farms and set up farm plans for the next crop year.

Only bona fide farm families with sufficient experience to qualify them for successful ownership are eligible. Preference will be given to married persons, those with dependent families and to persons having sufficient livestock and equipment to carry on farming operations. They must be unable to secure credit for farm purchase from other sources.

Families approved for tenant purchase loans by the county tenant purchase committee will be made loans sufficient to purchase land, construct buildings and improve or to repair existing buildings and improvements if necessary. The loans are made for forty years with interest at 3 percent.

Applications and full details of the program may be secured at the county supervisors office.

**Farmers Urged to Increase Production**

Family type farmers and small operators cooperating in the Clackamas county farm security administration program are being urged to increase production of milk, eggs, chickens and pork this year to increase their incomes and share in the expanding market for these products resulting from the department of agriculture's Food for Defense, says

Clive W. Cook, county FSA supervisor, 11 Beaver Bldg., Oregon City.

"Secretary of Agriculture, Claude R. Wickard has announced that prices of these commodities will be supported thru department purchase on the following levels (Chicago market). Hogs, \$9 per cwt; butter 31c per lb; eggs 22c per doz; and chickens 15c per lb. Cook said.

"Supplies acquired by the department will be used for lease lend food aid to Britain and other countries. Red Cross shipments, distribution to needy and destitute families thru the state welfare agencies, free school lunches and release on the market in case of unwarranted speculative price rises. Increased home consumption of these products will also be urged to build a healthier America and strengthen our home defense efforts."

FSA families can support the Food for Defense program with little change in present farm plans or outlay of additional funds, explained Cook thru added feeding for sustained egg production and increased milk production, saving their best heifer calves.

**300 TWENTY-ONE YEAR OLDS WILL REGISTER IN ESTACADA**

Between 250 and 300 lads who have become 21 years old since the first registration under the national selective service act will appear in Estacada next Tuesday, July 1 to be enrolled at draft board headquarters.

They come from the second district of Clackamas county which takes in all the east part which includes Milwaukie, Ardenwald, Sandy, Boring, Colton and Molalla.
