Lack of food, scanty shelter, disease and childbirth all took toll of lives there in the meadows of Lispenard.

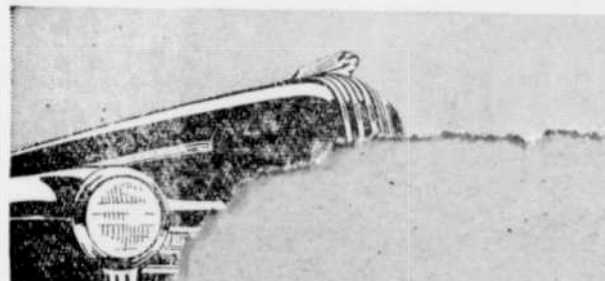
