

As the modern pony express is a  
civic venture sponsored by Timber-  
line lodge and the Oswego hunt club  
near Portland no charge is being

ing a self-addressed envelope bearing  
a three cent stamp.

Five cowboy riding teams from Ore-

will relay the mail sacks on the run  
at points ten miles apart. Included  
in the entries are the sheriff's moun-  
ted posse of Klickitai county, Wash.,  
and Clackamas county, Oregon. Sher-  
iff's C. G. House and Fred Reakseck-  
er will ride the last lap for their  
respective teams.

Western saddles and cowboy rid-  
ing equipment are required and as  
the route used back tracks almost ex-  
actly the original overland route  
from the middle west into the Ore-  
gon country spectators will find it  
easy to imagine themselves watching  
the transfer of "fast mails" of a cen-  
tury ago.
