ANNUAL WESTERN SHOW AT MOLALLA IS BIGGER AND BETTER THAN EVER

The biggest roundup ever staged at Molalla is taking place this week in Estacada's neighboring city. Record crowds are expected today, July 4th, and it is expected that attendance records will be broken during the remaining days, July 5 and 6.

Nationally known cowboys are competing in the events including Clay Carr, 1940 champion R. A. A. calf roper, Lee Perkins, bulldogger and roper of Phoenix, Ariz., and many others.

George Sky Eagle and Blue Wing Cherokee Indians from Oklahoma, and Frank and Bernice Dean of Livermore, Calif., both expert trick riding and roping teams are featured. Sky Eagle also is a bow and arrow marksman and will demonstrate archery.

The cowpokes are coming for the \$2650 in prize money and events of the afternoon programs include bronc riding, bulldogging, calf roping, bull riding, bareback riding, wild cow milking contests, relay, cowboy, cowgirl, roman and relay racing trick roping and riding and other features.

Estacada's own riding club, Riders of the Cascades, are billed to take part in the western drill competition on Sunday, July 6th.

They are aroused to the vital need for demanding enforcement of the forest laws and educating every citizen to realize his or her responsibility in checking the damage and waste caused every year by man-made preventable fires."

Everyone interested in the cause is being invited this week to enroll in the Keep Oregon Green association. Annual dues are 25 cents and entitle the member to an attractive enameled metal pin. All proceeds from this week's membership enrollment will be used for educational and publicity purposes.

The United States government will provide the buildings but the USO turn to you and your fellow citizens everywhere for aid in operating the program.

JULY FOOD STAMP LIST IS NAMED

During July all fresh vegetables available on local markets can be purchased with blue stamps by families taking part in the federal food stamp plan according to announcement made today by Mr. Belangie, area supervisor of the surplus marketing administration.

More than 60,000 public assistance families will participate in the plan and by placing all fresh vegetables on the blue stamp list it is expected that considerable increase in the consumption of seasonal local surpluses of perishable truck crops will result.

In addition to all fresh vegetables which includes all varieties of potatoes, other commodities available to blue stamp users during July are:

Shell eggs, fresh oranges, fresh peaches, pork lard, pork meats (except cooked, or packed in glass or metal containers,) corn meal, hominy, (corn) grits, dry edible beans, prunes, wheat flour, and whole wheat (graham) flour and raisins.

Families taking part in the food stamp plan use blue stamps to secure any of the above commodities from their certified neighborhood markets. Orange food stamps which participants purchase thru their welfare agency are exchangeable at local certified markets for any and all foods for human consumption.

With each dollar's worth of orange stamps purchased the participant receives free a certain amount of blue stamps which are restricted to purchasing the above commodities only.

Neither type of stamp can be used to procure beer, wine, liquor, tobacco or household items.

Della W. Shriener Called by Death

FORMER RESIDENT OF GARFIELD WAS LAST OF OLD PIONEER FAMILY

Della Wills Shriener, last of one of Portland's oldest pioneer families, died June 18th, 1941 in Los Angeles, Calif. She was the last of the Jacob Will family who crossed the plains and settled in the west, taking up a donation land claim what later became part of Portland, Ore., a part where the Reed college now stands. She was married to I. N. L. Shriener November 4, 1880, and had he lived a few months longer they would have been married 50 years. They lived at a place known as Willsburg for many years, then moved to Pleasant Home, Oregon. In 1922 they moved to Ashland, Oregon, where Mr. Shriener died 8 months later. She then returned to Pleasant Home and vicinity where she lived until 3 years ago when she went to Los Angeles.

She was buried in Ashland, Oregon beside her husband and leaves five children Walter Shriener of Estacada, Etta Banks of San Francisco, Wilhelmina Fredene of Los Angeles, Ray Shriener of PeEll, Wash., and Lloyd Shriener of Oswego, Ore. Also ten grandchildren and three great grand children to mourn her loss.

We of the Estacada community knew her as Grandma Shriener, when she lived with her son Walter and family in the Garfield district for several years.

John David Roper is First Registrant

The first new 21-year old to register for selective service at Clackamas county draft board No. 2 of Estacada was John David Roper of Molalla.

The young man arrived at headquarters in the Masonic building at 7:15 a.m. Tuesday, the day set by law for all young men who became 21 years of age since last October 16 to sign up and was duly registered by Mrs. Frank Shelton and Mrs. F. E. Dooley clerks.

Registration hours were from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. The new enrollees will not receive order numbers for at least a week or ten days according to draft board authorities.

No date has been set so far for the national lottery on the last registration.

All men who are over 28 years of age as of June 30 have been placed on the deferred list according to announcement this week.
