EARLY PEACH SEASON THIS YEAR

The peach season in the Willamette valley is very early this year. In some orchards the peach trees were in full bloom on the first of March. Hilltop Orchard located near Eagle Creek reports that their Rochester peaches which normally ripen about the second week in August will be ripe the first of the coming week. Their Improved Early Alberta (Slappy) peaches will bear a very light crop this year due to blossom blight will be ripe by the first of August.

Other varieties of Hilltop Orchard peaches such as Rochester, Earl Elberta, Valiant and Hale are bearing a very heavy crop and due to the wet weather in May and June the peaches should run to large sizes.

The housewives who have been canning Improved Early Elberta peaches should this year plan to can Rochester, Valiant or Earl Elberta for at least a part of their canning needs. These varieties are all high flavored and have a reputation of being among the best of canning peaches. When fully tree ripened they are full flavored.

Housewives who plan to can Willamette valley peaches must remember that due to the early season they should plan to do their peach canning this year about three weeks earlier than in normal seasons.

The flat topped cans each hold as much as a bottle, but they occupy only one-half as much space in the refrigerator, and they can be stacked.

But there is another advantage, not so obvious until you have

tasted the beer, that has contributed to the popularity of these cans scientifically prepared to contain this beverage. And that is the universal verdict that it tastes better than beer in bottles. The reasons for this better taste are that the time of pasteurization has been reduced in the cans and that the beer is protected from light which is harmful to beer flavor.

And a final advantage to this new boon to housewives which has also contributed to its popularity is that the cans are easy to open. A can opener for liquids has been perfected with which you can cut a triangular hole in the tops of the cans by exerting a little pressure as you would to slice a piece of cheese.

A Scientific Development

Like most seemingly simple useful things, such as an electric light bulb, for instance, this kegged can has years of laboratory work and scientific studies behind it. The big can manufacturing company which developed it has specialized for thirty years in making can inner coatings, and devoted years of research to perfecting this special can to contain beer.

The result was a can quite different from the ordinary can in which you purchase corn and beans. It looks the same on the outside, but its interior is adapted particularly for the purpose for which it is made.

This scientific development of a formula for the special coating which performs the same functions as the coating of a brewer's wooden keg has attracted worldwide attention.
