THIS WEEK IN DEFENSE

The President asked Congress for nearly six billion dollars more for lend lease materials. Lend lease administrator Stettinius was given power to approve aid requests. This with other changes is expected to cut from 30 to 15 days the period between receipt of a request and actual authorization for assistance.

Mr. Roosevelt told Congress that of the original seven billion appropriated six months ago all but \$720,000,000 is "now moving thru the successive stages of allocation, obligation, production and delivery." He

said \$246,400,000 in materials and \$78,170,000 in services has been given the anti-Axis nations.

The defense supplies corporation, an RFC subsidiary contracted with Amtorg Trading corporation a U.S. corporation owned in Russia for the purchase of \$100,000,000 on manganese, chromite, asbestos and platinum. The supplies agency arranged to pay Amtorg half of the amount in advance so Russia could use the money to buy war materials here. Treasury secretary Morgenthau similarly advanced the Soviet Union \$50,000,000 on future gold deliveries to the United States.

Navy Protecting Ships

Navy secretary Knox told the American Legion convention the navy is using all methods, including convoys to protect vessels of all flags carrying aid to Britain. He said the navy has orders to capture or destroy by every means at their disposal. Axis-controlled submarines or surface raiders in the waters between the U.S. and Iceland.

Neutrality Act Interpretation

The state department announced that as a result of an interpretation by the attorney general that the "United Kingdom" is only England, Wales, Scotland and North Ireland American ships may henceforth carry war supplies and passengers to parts of the British Empire not designated by the President to be in combat zones. Under this interpretation American ships are still barred from going to France, Poland, India, the United Kingdom, Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the Union of South Africa.

Navy Expansion Progress

The navy reported it has contracted for 2831 ships including 332 fighting vessels, every ship authorized under the seven billion dollar program to create "the greatest array of fighting ships under one flag in the world." 32 battleships, 18 aircraft carriers, 91 cruisers, 364 destroyers and 186 submarines a total fighting fleet of 691 ships.

Ships

The navy announced development of a 1900 ton cargo vessel the Sea Otter so "light in weight, simple in construction, relatively cheap in both original cost and upkeep, it will challenge the submarine and provide a new bridge to the free nations of the world." The vessel is so small it can be built in inland yards in two months. It will carry an anti-aircraft battery, be manned by only a few men, make 12 knots and be capable of a 5000 mile voyage.

VALE OF VIOLA

Altho we have had a freakish summer with drouths and storm the harvest has been a good one. Vegetables in almost endless variety were abundant all summer. Now that the fall rains have come gardens have taken on a new lease of life. A late crop of beans hangs on the vines, tomatoes are ripening in spite of a dearth of sunshine. Corn that stood shiveled and almost worthless filled out the cobs with golden grain. Cabbage grew fast and the tender heads split with the fullness. Carrots and all root crops speeded up growth rejoicing in the mellow earth that the rains had produced. They push one another out of the rows in their eagerness to expand. The valley is green in bright new verdure.

The golden rod is showy in the fields and along the roadsides. There is a tame variety cultivated in flower gardens that far outshines the wild. It is as showy and bright as the Scotch broom. Its racemes of small golden yellow spread fan shaped over the flower at its feet. These flowers are the late zinnias, dwarf dahlias, nasturtiums and pansies washed clear with the copious warm rains. It stands even with the tall ferns and star like flowers of the latter.

Round about all over the garden small plants of scattered seed are appearing. Hundreds of pansies are noticed and large numbers of calendulas, phlox, spandragons, and fox glove plants have started for next year's planting.

Half the leaves on the locust trees in the school yard have turned yellow. The oak tree shows a brown coat. There is more red appearing in the orchards and a spot of

yellow flashes among the green fir on the hills. It is the beginning of the end of a full year of work, a accomplishment and fulfillment of sires.—Z. H.

SAVING ON ELECTRICITY

As government departments steps to cut down on civilian consumption of necessary materials consumer is gradually benefitting an education in economy.

We have learned for instance a result of the alleged gasoline shortage how we can drive a car on gasoline than we have used past.

Now because of a shortage electricity we are to be taught to get along with less electricity. Some of us have always thought electricity was limitless.

But now with an impending shortage due to the great amount needed for running defense we are offered dozens of suggestions for cutting down our electricity. Outstanding among those are the following:

1 Turn out lights when not needed.

2 Watch the basement light sometimes burns all night.

3 Conserve on hot water have an electric water heater.

4 Keep the thermostat electric water between 120 degrees, no higher.

5 Keep the radio on on tending to it.

6 Turn off the electric it is not badly needed.

7 Use very small bulb urgently needed night light.

8 Use all other electric sparingly and efficiently. Electric mixer, toaster, vacuum washing machine, vacuum and iron.

9 Don't put hot food on the refrigerator.

10 See that your refrigerator is properly placed in your kitchen. Your refrigerator should be in the coolest part of the room away from your radiator, steam pipes oven or hot sun. All of those suggestions are good practical ones which require no sacrifice and which will save money on your electric bill is to invest money in defense stamps.

THE SILK STOCKING AREA

As prominent women begin setting an example for the conservation of silk by wearing cotton stockings it is interesting to review the rise and fall of the silk stocking era.

In 1899 at the turn of the century silk stockings first made their appearance in American stores. That year 12,572 pairs of silk stockings were sold which constituted one pair sold for every 2500 pairs of cotton stockings. It didn't look then as if silk stockings were going to go over with women and even ten years later in 1909 less than one pair of the stockings sold were made of silk.

It was not until after the last war that silk stockings approached the popularity which they have had recently. Even in 1919 over half of the stockings sold to women were made of cotton but during the next ten years cotton stockings became a drug on the market. In 1919 about 86 percent of women were wearing silk stockings and last year over 90 percent of the stockings sold were made of silk or rayon.

Girls who have grown up during the period since the last war may find it hard to get used to the cotton stocking idea but mothers should have less difficulty dropping a fashion which has actually had such a comparatively short life.

As for men most of them have never cared whether their socks were made of silk, cotton or rayon. All have preferences, but last year only about five percent of men's socks were made of silk.
