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Sandy Will Play Estacada

SANDY AND ESTACADA HIGH FOOTBALL TEAMS TO CLASH ON ESTACADA FIELD TODAY

Much interest is being shown in the football game between the Estacada Rangers and the Sandy Pioneers which is scheduled to take place this afternoon, Friday, October 10, on the Estacada gridiron. Game is called at 2 p.m.

The Sandy Pioneers sprung a big surprise in their game last Friday when they defeated the strong Silverton eleven.

The Estacada Rangers have been greatly improving in their play and last Friday made a fine showing against the strong Parkrose maulers, Parkrose winning by only a 7 to 0 score.

In the game with Parkrose the Estacada Rangers had a very good line but the backfield was weakened by several of the experienced men being injured. The two teams were practically even so far as yardage was concerned. Parkrose scored in the last 30 seconds of play.

A large delegation is expected to accompany the Sandy team here this afternoon and Estacada fans are expected to turn out en masse.

Demand for Acreage Increases

Combat Planes to Stage Raids

MAYOR WOOSTER IS ADVISED ARMY PLANS TO INCORPORATE THIS CITY IN BLACKOUT

A meeting of the Clackamas county defense council was held on Tuesday evening of this week for the purpose of making final arrangements for the air force combat exercises from Tuesday, October 28 to Saturday, November 1st. The purpose of these exercises will be to test the effectiveness of air defense in the Oregon area west of the Cascade mountains.

Daylight flights of planes will blanket the skies throughout this territory to test the keenness of vision and accuracy of reports from the observation posts located in approximately every six square miles of terrain. High light of the air force combat exercises will be an all out attack on the cities of this area lasting from noon, October 31st to noon, November 1st, including night raids with flares, bombs etc. All cities are asked to blackout in this section and take other precautions against the raiders.

Mayor Gets Notice

In advising Mayor S. E. Wooster that the U. S. army plans to incorporate the city of Estacada in their blackout he has been requested to attend a meeting to be held in Portland next Tuesday at which time the scope of Estacada's participation and coordination with Portland will be outlined. Mayor Wooster has also been asked to have the Estacada Fire chief, Harry Sarver, attend this meeting to get pointers.

Two Poultry Meetings are Scheduled for October

Two meetings involving poultrymen have recently been announced for October.

On the 15th of this month a one day course of instruction on the field test for pullorum disease in chickens will be given at Oregon state college at the request of the state department of agriculture. The session will start at 1 o'clock and is open, with the payment of a registration fee, to all interested in complying with regulations for shipment of baby chicks and hatching eggs into certain states and for those training for participation in the program of the Oregon poultry improvement association.

The second meeting is the annual two day fall session of the Oregon Baby chick association and will be held in the Oregon City high school October 21 and 22 starting at 10 o'clock each day. The first day's meeting is limited to members or prospective members of the association. The program on the second day is open to the public and is arranged to be of benefit particularly to flock owners producing hatching eggs.

Fred Cockell of Milwaukie newly elected president of the International Baby chick association will be among the speakers as will representatives of Oregon state college and others.

The Buckeroo directorate also voted \$10 to the Clackamas county girl scouts drive and previously allotted \$25 to the Oregon City first aid truck.

Freshman Enrollment at OSC Above Expectations

Although freshman registration at Oregon state college was larger than officials had predicted a slight drop in total registration was foreseen on the basis of early enrollment of old students. Defense demand for both military service and trained workers is interfering with normal enrollment of men, although the government is encouraging continuation of college training particularly in technical schools.

First days complete registration of new students showed 1580 this year compared with 1539 last year a gain of three percent. Later registration was expected to bring the total freshman class to about 1600 and the total of all classes somewhat below the 4759 reached last fall.

Pomona Grange Meet at Boring

Pomona grangers of Clackamas county at their quarterly meeting held at Damascus grange hall in Boring Wednesday went on record endorsing United States Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau's proposal to claim as taxes all corporation profits above 6 percent on invested capital.

In other resolutions the 250 grangers berated the government for relaxing oleomargarine laws to permit butter-like flavoring and preservatives believed harmful to health, and asked the AAA for lowering of the germination test limit on hairy vetch to 85 percent, the present on crimson clover.
