VALE OF VIOLA

It is perhaps amusing when we contemplate the results of our frenzied spring planting. We reached out for everything. Planted with great hopes in the soft mellow earth of garden. Waited "till danger of frost" had passed. Spent hours hoeing and pulling weeds that the young seedlings might thrive unhindered. Visualized boxes of gleaming tomatoes, crates of cabbage, quantities of golden carrots, beans, corn and onions.

We were very careful when we planted our cabbage seed for we had one package of purple and one of green. We were growing the purple because it was free from aphid and worms, we had been told. The seed was planted in two long rows in a bed in the garden. First the green were planted and then the purple alongside. Although the seed came up strong and vigorous and we set them out first from the green row and then from the purple all we reaped were green, no purple ones appearing. And it's that way today all green cabbage, no purple.

And the same with squash. We wanted the golden crook neck and reaped the white scalloped. We do not like the white scalloped and the same were wasted on the vines.

Along with the tomato seed planted in the early spring in boxes in the house we put in many of another kind, the large yellow for variety. We had hopes of boxes of bright red and bright yellow tomatoes setting side by side. Although great care was taken to plant the red and yellow plants in separate rows just two or three turned out yellow, the rest a dingy red.

It has been that way with flower seed too. And who is to blame we do not know. There is a mixup somewhere for plants come true to seed. But we will not be disappointed another year in squash at any rate for we have brot back from a neigh-

bor a hard shelled golden crooked neck squash.—Z. H.
