Sawdust Burner Study Reported in Bulletin

The use of sawdust burners too large for the furnace and for the home to be heated is the most common cause of difficulty with the heating plants so popular in the Pacific north west, reports Earl Willey assistant professor of mechanical engineering at Oregon state college in a new bulletin entitled "Rating and Care of Domestic Sawdust Burners." This is the first piece of technical literature dealing with the domestic sawdust burner and is already in considerable demand from manufacturers, dealers and users.

"Underheating is a rare thing with sawdust burners" concludes Professor Willey "If it occurs it is generally caused by poor draft conditions of the chimney. The writer has yet to see a burner installed in a home that was too small for the house."

Oversized burners cause trouble when it is necessary to shut them down completely to control the heat of the house Prof. Willey explained. An auxiliary air intake is provided to keep the fire from being extinguished entirely. If the burner itself is of excessive size this auxiliary air intake provides enough draft so that overheating may continue. If on the other hand this air intake is reduced the fire will smoulder and unburned gas will accumulate in the combustion chamber which is a potential source of the much dreaded backfiring and creosoting.

Prof. Willey reports that domestic size sawdust burners are well adapted to automatic control and that as much as 25 percent of the fuel may be saved by this method as compared with manual controls. The bulletin discusses methods of rating sawdust burners, the comparative value of different fuel, and various angles on the operation and care of domestic sawdust burners

WAR RELATES OF "AWFUL HELL"

Following are some extracts taken from a letter received last week by Rev. Sydney W. Hall pastor of the Gresham Methodist church and received from Mrs. Hall's nephew at Bristol, England. It is reprinted from the Gresham Outlook.

"I am on duty in a hospital this week from 7:30 to 2:00 p.m., next week night duty, 9 to 7:30 a.m. and the week after 2 to 9 p.m. I love the work of the hospital but as I am a mobile nurse I am sent out to all the blitzes that's what I don't like. I have experienced some awful things and towards the end my nerves were giving out. It's awful you know to be called out while bombs are raining down, explosions occurring and fires burning whole streets away. I was called out Good Friday night to a spot where (censored) has been (censored)."

"We work of course in conjunction with rescue squads and what marvelous brave men they are. That night nearly finished me. I was spent and sick at heart. Since that night things have been quieter in Bristol and as I said just now we have had time to recuperate and our nerves have steadied down. Now we wonder what we must endure this coming winter."

We English people are banking on the help of the U. S. tremendously. You have played the game so far and we know you will see us thru.

"The hay harvest in England has been the best for years and the wheat harvest is also going to be good. Now we hope that it can all be gathered in before Hitler plans to burn it or use gas. The latter is a thing to dread and lot of people say that Hitler won't use gas."

It's a game now with the clothes coupons. We are allowed 40 coupons from September 1 to June 1. When you realize that a pair of stockings takes 3 and a coat 15 and a suit 2g, 40 won't go far. I am fortunate because we get nurses uniforms even to shoes without coupons, and as I am in uniform more than out of it it shall make my 40 do."

One of the members of Mrs. Hall's nephews family had previously planned to come to the U. S. to make his home at Gresham with Rev. and Mrs. Hall, while he finished school but the boat on which he was scheduled to sail was filled to overflowing by the time it reached Bristol and he was forced to abandon his plans. The same boat was carrying more than 600 children enroute to this country was later torpedoed at sea and many were lost.
