**Can Secure Purebred Sires**

Clackamas county dairymen with herds of four to fifteen cows can secure purebred sires on a cooperative basis for much less than the cost of maintaining an individual grade sire thru cooperative service sponsored by the Farm Security, Clive W. Cook, county FSA supervisor, Beaver Building, Oregon City, Oregon.

While purebred bull rings must be initiated by farmers cooperating with Farm Security other small dairymen in the community can participate on an equal basis said Cook. Sufficient loan funds are available to bring a number of purebred dairy bulls into the county on the basis of joint ownership and joint use cooperatively. Loans can be made for a period of five years with interest at three percent on the unpaid balance.

"Dairymen of the county generally agree there is a serious need for more purebred and proven dairy sires to raise both the quality of herds and butterfat production. Purebred bulls are usually beyond the reach of the individual small dairyman but can be made available at a low cost if several dairymen in a community cooperate in setting up bull rings," Cook explained.

Farmers cooperating in the department of agriculture's farm security program and small dairymen interested in securing purebred sires thru the community and cooperative service program are advised to get in touch with the Farm Security office, 11 Beaver Bldg, Oregon City, Oregon.

Although the general trout season closed on October 15 anglers may fish for trout ten inches or over in coastal streams. From now until December 31, 1941 the daily bag limit for trout in tidewater will be 15 fish or fifteen pounds. After January 1, 1942 the bag limit on trout 10 inches or over will be three fish a day.

Above tidewater the bag limit for trout ten inches or over will be three trout a day. This limit is provided in order that fishermen angling for steelheads or salmon will be protected if they should accidentally land a trout above tidewater.

Steelhead and salmon fifteen inches or over may be taken at all times of the year below and above tidewater.
