Seek to Conserve Soil on Farms

To conserve the soil and the fertility of the farms owned by the Federal Land bank and the Federal Farm Mortgage corporation all acreages seeded on these farms in 1942 will be in compliance with the agricultural conservation program allotments. H. Oliver Buxton, Oregon City, secretary-treasurer of the national farm loan association serving Clackamas county announced this week.

"Not only will this keep the farms in the best productive state possible until the properties can be returned to family ownership," Buxton said, "but just as importantly it will mean that the operators of these farms will be able to cooperate with the food for defense program."

In the first nine months of 1941, 7 sales of properties owned by these organizations in Clackamas county were handled thru his office Buxton said. These sales amounted to \$28,392.57.

"Requirements for compliance with acreage allotments apply only to farms owned by the land bank or the federal farm mortgage corporation," Buxton pointed out. "Borrowers and those purchasing farms from both institutions hold title to their own farms and therefore decide for themselves whether they will comply with the program."

CHINA PHEASANT SEASON OPENS THIS WEEK

At 8 a.m. last Wednesday morning, October 22 the three day China pheasant season in western Oregon officially opened. The other two days of the season come on Saturday and Sunday, October 25 and 26.

Inasmuch as experience has shown that artificial propagation cannot keep up the the increased demand for China pheasants steps have been taken to promote greater natural production.

With this in mind the Oregon state game commission under the federal Pittman-Robertson act has set aside approximately 100,000 acres in the Willamette valley as reserves for young birds. This territory comprises but 1-27th of the entire valley area and thru such reserves the commission is making an effort to avoid closures and maintain the supply and thus perpetuate hunting for the benefit of the hunter.

The reserves are not only designed to protect a nucleus of birds until they can build up a supply and increase the number on the reserve but also to help populate the adjoining areas. Reserves now set up will not be closed perpetually but only for a few years when they will again be open to hunters and other areas established in alternative in the same manner and like period.

The bag limit in the valley will be not more than two male birds in any one day or more than four birds in the entire season of three days. Counties included in the valley area include Multnomah, Clackamas, Columbia, Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Marion, Benton, Lane and Linn counties.

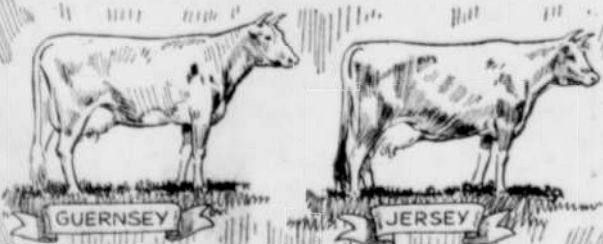
