## Will Protect Farm Prices

Oregon farmers who volunteer to help in producing the increased quantities of dairy products .eggs, chickens and hogs sought in the 1942 farm defense program will have protection of new federal farm legislation against price collapses for these particular commodities, Robt. B .Taylor chairman of the state USDA agriculture defense board pointed out this week.

This new act of Congress the Stea. gall amendment requires the secretary of agriculture to give public notice whenever he finds it necessary to encourage the expansion of any non-basic commodity. The law furth er directs him to use public funds to support the farm price of the commodity at not less than 85 percent of parity.

Before the secretary can dicontinue a price-supporting program he must give sufficient public notice of the termination to permit producers to make a readjustment in production Taylor explained.

Secretary Wickard has already given public notice covering until December 31 ,1942 eggs, hogs, evaporated milk, dry skim milk, cheese and chickens. This protection is not required now because the farm prices of all of these commodities are well above the 85 percent parity level. These "floor prices" will enable far-
