J. S. Cox, Portland suffered injuries that caused his death a short time later at the Portland sanitarium while his companion Lester Clark and the other driver Howard Coffman received

slight injuries.

State police who investigated said the Coffman car swerved out of its line of traffic and collided with the other car, both machines being badly damaged.

Coffman was cited on a reckless driving charge and will be given a hearing in the Sandy justice court.

NATIVE PIONEER HOPES TO BE 87

Pleas Rook one of Oregon's best known native pioneers called on friends here this week. Rook admits he is "not very well" but says "I've still got the grit of a bulldog and God willing I'll be 87 this coming November 21."

Rook was born near the Franklin high school site in Portland but spent most of his life near the Multnomah-Clackamas county line about five miles west of Sandy. He was a Multnomah county deputy sheriff in early days and frequently when carrying a complaint from Multnomah county for an arrest would have to ride horseback all the way to Eagle Creek to have the warrant endorsed if the "victim" crossed over into Clackamas county or lived in this area which often happened.

The complaint states that the lodge is being operated with the United States forest service for public benefit and that the taxes would interfere with governmental activities. The suit asks that the levies be stricken off.
