Investigating Accidental Death

Chief of police Niles of Portland this week announced that an investigation would be made into the death of Clarence Stith, 25, of Damascus. Stith was driving a loaded truck which crashed into the repair engine of the Portland Traction company at S.E. 89th avenue and Flavel streets just outside the Portland city limits. Stith died as a result of the accident.

According to the autopsy report death was caused from a fractured skull, internal injuries and first and second degree burns.

Reports state Stith did not die at once but was alive when volunteers attempted to remove him from the wreckage. An acetylene blow torch was used to cut steel braces pinning him in the wreck and this ignited spilled gasoline and resulted in the body being badly burned.

Labor Bill on Farms in Oregon Makes Big Total

That the cash payment of Oregon farmers for labor runs into huge figures is shown by census reports now being studied by extension economists at Oregon state college. The 1939 census shows for example that in 1939 about half the farms in Oregon made a cash outlay of about \$16,000,000 for labor.

This figure includes reports from only about half the farms and does not include the value of board and living quarters frequently supplied or payments made in the form of farm products. In 1939 the farm expense for labor accounted for approximately one-third of all farm production costs. Since the farm labor supply has been reduced by deforestation it is known that farm labor rates are now nearly half as high as they were in 1939 the extension economists point out.
