**LOWER DOG LICENSE FEES; ROADS TALKED**

Dog licenses and roads occupied most of the attention of the county court at the regular monthly session Wednesday morning. The dog license fees were reduced and road matters merely discussed.

Dog owners next year will pay 25 cents less for each license according to the order signed Wednesday. Male or spayed female dogs will require only a 50 cent license while females will take 75 cents. No license tags will be issued. The penalty of \$1 for each dog not licensed by March 1, 1942 will remain in force. All dogs more than eight months of age must be licensed.

It is figured the county will lose about \$2000 by making this reduction but license fee collections this year exceeded money necessary to carry on the work for which the fees were intended so the reduction was granted. There are about 8000 licensable dogs in the county and the owners of about one-fourth of these paid the \$1 penalty this year for not buying licenses before the deadline.

There was some talk of requiring a certificate showing the dog had been inoculated for rabies as a prerequisite for a license but it was learned that the state law would have to be amended to carry such a restriction—Banner-Courier.

Prior to this order the truckers were hauling logs all times except from 8 p.m. till midnight under permits issued by the state which circumvented a highway commission ruling adopted several years ago which barred log trucks from the highways on Saturday afternoons, Sundays and after dark.

The county court was opposed to the after hour hauling and that the ruling of the commission protected the county roads from excessive use by logging trucks. On the excuse that more logs were needed for national defense Mr. Baidock's department lifted the week end and night hauling ban by the issuance of permits. The county court maintains this excuse spurious, that the river is full of logs and that Portland mills are reducing production due to defense restrictions on lumber use for home and industrial construction.

Inasmuch as the law gives the court power to regulate traffic over any county road and the log trucks must use county roads to reach the state highways or to run from the highways to log dumps the truckers are stymied according to prevalent opinion.—Banner-Courier.
