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## Want Men 17 to 50 for Navy

Men Enlisting in U. S. Naval Reserve to be Kept Only for Duration of War

According to an announcement made this week in Washington by order of Secretary of the Navy Knox, "All men enlisting in the Naval Reserve will be retained on active duty throughout the period of the national emergency but they will be released as soon as their services can be spared regardless of the length of time remaining in their enlistment."

Enlistment in the U. S. Naval Reserve is for four years but if a man enlists and the emergency ends within a period of several months he will be returned to his civilian job as soon as possible after the emergency is over and will not be required to complete his four year term in active service.

Four classes of service in the U. S. Naval Reserve need men urgently today. They are Class V-3 which includes radio and communications; V-5 aviation; V-6 for trade specialists or men desiring trade or vocational training; V-7 fleet officers. A more detailed outline of each class follows.

Men with specialized training in radio, searchlight and semaphore signaling or Morse telegraphy may be enrolled in Class V-3 the communications class of the Naval Reserve. These men will be enlisted as petty officers with ratings according to their degrees of proficiency. Pay for men enrolling in this group ranges from \$60 a month for a petty officer third class to \$99 a month for a chief petty officer. An additional allowance of \$1.15 per day is made for men with dependents who have the rating of petty officer second class or higher.

A man with at least two years of college education who desires to enter naval aviation will be enlisted as a seaman second class in Class V-5 of the Naval Reserve. After a month's preliminary training the V-5 recruit will become a naval aviator cadet and will be sent to one of the three principal naval flight training centers, Pensacola, Fla., Jacksonville, Fla., or Corpus Christi, Tex. On completion of this advanced course which requires approximately seven months the V-5 will be designated as a naval aviator and will be commissioned as an ensign in the U. S. Naval Reserve.

During the first month of training V-5 recruits are paid \$36. On completion of the first months training the V-5 recruit is designated as a naval aviator cadet and will be paid \$75 a month plus \$1 per day living expenses. Upon commission as an ensign his pay will be increased to approximately \$245 a month and in addition he will receive regular pay bonuses of \$500 for each year he serves in active duty after the training period.

Class V-6 in the Naval Reserve offers opportunities for men with specialized training to continue their trades and at the same time serve their country. This group includes specialists of any kind such as electricians, carpenters, machinists, stenographers, accountants, plumbers, cooks, bakers and many other trades and vocations. These men will upon being given ratings in accordance with the amount of previous specialized training they have had.

Men with no previous specialized training will be enlisted in Class V-6 as apprentice seamen with pay of \$21 a month. Directly following enlistment the new recruit will be sent to one of four naval training stations for a short period. At the training station the apprentice seamen will be given an aptitude test and if he passes this test satisfactorily he will be sent to a navy trade school. Approximately 5500 men are admitted to navy trade schools each month. This schooling is free and seamen receiving their regular navy pay while receiving instructions.

Those applicants who do not pass their tests for admission to a navy trade school will be sent on duty on board ship where an opportunity will be given them to train in a trade. Four months after enlistment all non-specialized applicants in Class V-6 will be advanced automatically to seaman second class with a pay increase to \$36 a month.

## MAN FOUND DEAD IN CAR NEAR ESTACADA

The body of a man believed to be Leslie Frederick Baker, 22 of Portland was found in Baker's automobile on the Springwater-Logan road overlooking the Clackamas river last Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock by Arthur Dibbs of Oregon City rt. 3.

A .38 caliber revolver was found near the body and deputy coroner Arnold Bierman and deputy sheriffs who investigated said it apparently was a case of suicide.

Arthur Dibbs who found the body said he saw the car parked off the highway in the morning and again when returning in the evening. He stopped and found the young man dead. Dibbs immediately notified the sheriff's office.

Deputy sheriff Joe Shobe found that the man apparently fired two shots one passing thru his clothing not touching the flesh. The second bullet entered the body. One empty shell from the single shot revolver was found and the second was in the revolver.

Any kind will be enlisted in the Naval Reserve class V-6 with petty officer ratings and will be sent immediately to the ship or shore station where they are needed.

College graduates who desire engineering or deck duty as officers in the Naval Reserve will be enlisted as midshipmen, Class V-7. Upon completion of a four months training course these men will be commissioned ensigns in the naval reserve. During the training period midshipmen are paid \$65 a month. As ensigns with commissions the pay will be approximately \$143 a month with an additional allowance of \$40 a month if they are married.

All applicants for the Naval Reserve must be native-born citizens of the United States with the exception of candidates for Class V-5 who must have been U. S. citizens for a period of at least 10 years.
