So says the Oregon department of agriculture which has just been so advised by the California department of agriculture. This is not just a holiday measure but will prevail at any time.

Persons taking one of two boxes of apples into California in their private cars should purchase packed boxes bearing labels indicating that the fruit was actually packed in Oregon or Washington so border inspectors may know definitely the origin of the fruit.

Either Oregon or Washington residents carrying boxes of packed apples into California will not be subjected to excessive delay at the border stations because they have the apples in their possession.

### ESTACADA SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH TO BE DEDICATED DECEMBER 6TH

The new Seventh-Day Adventist church at Estacada will be formally dedicated with appropriate ceremony this coming Saturday, December 13.

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### WILL RAISE PUREBRED GUERNSEY CATTLE

Ed Adams who recently purchased the R. H. Currin farm at Currinville one of the best known ranches in Clackamas county said this week that he expects to raise purebred Guernsey cattle and Chester White hogs on his stock farm. The farm, composed of nearly one hundred acres, is ideal for this purpose.

Mr. Adams who comes here from Woodburn has been an Oregonian for the past three years and prior to that spent fourteen years in Alask.

Since Mr. Adams acquired the Currin farm he had drilled a well 155 feet deep. This well has a flow of 18 gallons a minute with a reserve of 500 gallons and should take care of all the stock watering and irrigation needs of the farm. The new owner is now having the old Currin barn remodeled and made modern. Electricity has been installed and new stanchions and other equipment are being put in. When completed it will be one of the most modern stock barns in this part of the county.

Mr. Adams recently brought a herd of 37 Holstein and Jersey cattle down from Woodburn to his new ranch. They are fine looking cattle.
