**Ample Supply of Fruit
Foreseen for Coming Year**

A smaller output of deciduous
fruits and more citrus is in prospect
in 1942 compared with 1941 accord-
ing to information in a review of
the outlook for fruits and nuts just
issued by the Oregon agricultural ex-
tension service. The report also in-
dicates that domestic demand will
continue strong while export fruit
business will remain at low level.

"It is not possible to estimate the
volume of fruit and nut production
in 1942 at this date," says the re-
port, "although general conditions
would suggest a smaller output of
deciduous fruit and more citrus than
this year. The citrus crop of 1942-43
may be the largest of record if no
serious damage to the crop occurs.
It is very probable that domestic de-
mand will be even stronger than the
high level of demand this year. It is
to be expected that costs of produc-
tion, harvesting, and marketing will
increase also.

"Beyond 1942 the outlook is for a
moderate increase in the rate of
fruit production for several years
owing to increases expected in citrus
fruits, peaches, pears, cherries,
plums, fresh prunes and grapes. Cit-
rus fruit production is expected to
continue to increase for several years
more. The production of apples and
dried prunes is expected to continue
to decline. Nut production is expect-
ed to increase further."

The complete fruit and nut out-
look report which contains several
important statistical tables and charts
is available from county agricultural
agents or direct from the college.

Filbert Output Grows Rapidly

Oregon now has approximately 23,
500 acres of walnuts and 11,600 ac-
res of filberts according to estimates
contained in the current agricultural
situation and outlook report issued
by Oregon state college. Average
filbert production for the period of
1926-1930 was only 162 tons per
year. Estimated production for
1941 is 5030 tons mostly in Ore-
gon. Total supply of filberts has
not increased however as imports of
filberts decreased from 5140 tons
per year, shelled, to 753 tons shelled
for the 1940-41 importing year.

**Home-Town Papers Held
Best Read Publications**

Home-town papers are read more
thoroly by rural people than any
other publications and hence they
are the most valuable medium for
discussing farm news according to
AAA committeemen attending the an-
nual conference at Oregon state col-
lege. One farmer serving on the edu-
cation committee of the conference
stated that although his group is
always glad to get news in the me-
tropolitan dailies the news that re-
ally counts in reaching a large pro-
portion of the farmers is that used
in the country weeklies.

The farmer committeemen recom-
mended that close contact be kept
between those dealing with the great
agricultural programs and the local
editors in order that each may be
of the greatest help to the other
to the benefit of the rural popula-
tion as a whole. The community
committeemen were urged to see that
local correspondents obtain prompt
and accurate reports of local hap-
penings relating to the farm pro-
grams.
