#### 1956 A Boom Year For Estacada?

We are a few short days into 1956. All of us are interested in knowing what the new year will hold for our town. If all the scheduled events come to pass it should be a year of boom and progress for Westminster Fellowship, 7 p.m. the entire area. Let's just look ahead a little to some of the things that may happen.

- 1. Construction on the Mt. Hood Plywood plant could very well begin some time in January. This mill should be in operation in 1956.
- 2. There is an excellent chance that the railroad into Estacada will be rebuilt in 1956.
- 3. PGE will begin work on its \$17,000,000 hydroelectric project five miles above Estacada in the spring of 1956. This will mean that 500 to 700 men will be employed on this dam alone.

Personally, we feel that all three of the above events will take place as scheduled and we think they will have a profound effect on the entire economy of Estacada.

There will be lots of activity in '56.

There will be a national election next year to choose a new president of our country. Oregon will either re-elect or reject Wayne Morse for another six-year term in the United States senate.

On the local level there will be an election for mayor of Estacada. Several councilman will be chosen at the same time. In the past year a tremendous amount of civic interest has been generated in local affairs. This interest may be reflected further in 1956 municipal elections by a record turnout at the polls.

Early in 1956 Estacada's new water system will be put into use. Improvements will be made in the present sewer treatment plant.

For Estacada, 1956 will be a year of progress and change. It will be a busy, full and interesting

It might even be a boom year.

#### Publisher Completes First Year


