The X-ray, "eye" of the radiol-or X-ray physician in mod-ern diagnostic medicine, is 60 years old. The ray was discovered November 8, 1895, when German physics professor Wilhelm Con-rad Roentgen was working in a small laboratory at the Univer-sity of Wurzburg. Since then, this medical specialty has grown to the point where some 40 to 50 million people will have been X-rayed in 1955, according to the American College of Radiology. Roentgen, described as "an ex-perimental physicist of the old achoel," had built most of his own equipment and was working alone school," had built most of his own equipment and was working alone in the laboratory at the time of the discovery. The fifty-year-old scientist was repeating experi-ments of two earlier physicists, Hertz and Lenard, with cathode vays.

In experimenting he held solid objects between a charged vac-uum tube and a screen coated with a fluorescent chemical. When the energy passed from the tube, through the solid articles includ-ing his own hand, Roentgen real-ined he must be dealing with a ized he must be dealing with a new kind of ray. In the last experiment flesh and bones were outlined as on a modern fluoroscopic screen. Roentgen conclud-ed from this that he had found a ray hitherto unknown. 
