City Recorder Bob Cooke reported on current developments. A Census Director from Earl Newbry's office will be in Estacada Sept. 19-23 for the purpose of compiling an official census. The City has also received a deed to a substantial area of the Estacada Park area which had been taken for taxes and which will be used for park and recreation purposes.

Mr. Cooke also reported on the Bureau of Land Management meeting held in Portland, on Friday. There were roughly 30 people in attendance and out of a registration of 27 there were 9 from Molalla, showing that Molalla has no little interest in obtaining an additional log supply by having the Colowash river area included in their timber marketing area. Estacada was represented by Bob Cooke and City Attorney John Caldwell who had previously gone on record with the Bureau that Estacada does not want its timber resources allocated elsewhere—and would cooperate in the event that some of the Molalla mills would care to move to Estacada in order to be eligible for timber from our area. The Bureau representatives seemed fair and are taking Molalla's requests under advisement.

MT. HOOD PLYWOOD GROUP HOLDS CONSTRUCTIVE MEETING

A special meeting of the Mt. Hood Plywood & Plywood Co-op was held on Sunday, Aug. 28th at the high school auditorium, with over 400 members attending.

Copies of the financial report as of July 31st were distributed, with the co-op accountant explaining the withdrawals from the treasury.

A progress report was asked from individual members of the board of directors. James Snyder and Charles Goddard commented on details of the lease agreement.

On a motion from the floor, Will Lock was removed from the board. Basis for his removal was that he had received over seven thousand dollars in salary while acting as a board member.

Mention was made that Al-an Wright had been removed as secretary of the board about two weeks ago. A motion was passed giving him twenty-four hours to deliver the complete records of the co-op to James Snyder, the new Secretary-Treasurer.

There was considerable discussion on the long delay in the start of construction of the plant. Doubt was expressed as to the ability of the organizers to raise the necessary capital on terms that would be profitable to the membership. An alternate proposal was offered whereby the group would reorganize under complete membership control, use funds remaining to build a green veneer plant, and borrow additional capital for expansion.

Mr. Wright, present manager, stated that he was invited to attend a meeting of the financial people on Tuesday, Aug. 30th, at which time some progress regarding obtaining a lease-option agreement and building funds would probably take place. A motion was passed by the membership au-

thorizing the board of directors to remove Wright as manager if nothing definite is accomplished before Sept. 3rd.

The cost of keeping floors varnished and waxed is very high. During the past few weeks numerous visitors have remarked favorably about the condition of our corridor and classroom floors.


Parents and pupils are asked to help with the elimination of cleats on shoes.

Eagle Creek School Fishermen Rescued Opening Set

Two Portland fishermen had a narrow escape last Saturday morning when they became stranded on the side of a cliff along the Clackamas river. After fishing at a point on the river about six miles above Estacada, near Kelley's Bluff, Mike Ruggiero and John A. Gundel attempted to scale the cliff to reach the Clackamas river road. Suddenly finding their way blocked, and unable to turn back, they were forced to cling to a ledge for about two hours, until help arrived. Providentially another fisherman, Elmo Williams, of Portland, stopped at a point on the highway just above the stranded pair and heard their cries for help. Alerted Foresters at North Fork Guard Station summoned help from the Forest Service personnel in Estacada, and the rescue crew, with the aid of long rope and telephone safety belts, brought the men to safety, unharmed but exhausted.

Student Needs Outlined

The Estacada Grade and Estacada Union High School will open Tuesday morning at 8:45, September 6th. Any child who will reach his sixth birthday on or before November 15th is eligible to start school. School busses will make their usual routes Tuesday morning. Any changes in routes will be worked out the first week. The busses will pick up students along the routes between 7:45 and 8:15 and will return the children shortly after 11 a.m. the first day. The grade school cafeteria will start serving hot lunches Wednesday, September 7th. Hot lunches will cost 25c at the grade school. Following is a list of items by grades that grade pupils should have:

FIRST GRADE—1 guide lined pencil tablet; 2 soft No. 2 lead pencils; 1 large eraser; 1 large box crayolas (16 colors); 1 box kleenex; 1 12-inch ruler.

SECOND GRADE—Same as first grade plus a pair of small sharp pointed scissors.

THIRD GRADE—Same as second graders plus 1 pair of tennis or gym shoes.

FOURTH GRADE—50c for "My Weekly Reader"; tennis shoes; ruler; eraser; 2 pencils; pencil tablet; spelling tablet; 1 pair sweat sox.

FIFTH GRADE—2 pencils; 1 spiral note book and paper; 1 box of crayons; 1 ball point pen; 80c for "Newstime"; 1 spelling tablet; 1 pencil tablet; 1 pair scissors; eraser; 1 ruler.

SIXTH GRADE—2 pencils; 1 notebook and paper; crayons 12-inch ruler; scissors; eraser.

SEVENTH GRADE—Same as sixth.

EIGHTH GRADE—80c for "Read Magazine"; 2 pencils; protractor ruler; note book & paper; crayons.

All fifth graders through the eighth grade should have the following for physical education:

GIRLS—1 pair of tennis shoes; gym shorts and gym blouse; towel; 50c for lock. All items should be marked with student's name.

BOYS—1 pair tennis shoes; gym shorts; 2 T-shirts; 2 pair sweat sox; athletic supporter; towel. All items should be marked with student's name.
