

City COUNCIL Meeting of Dec. 1,

Our town council must consider such a wide variety of subjects relating to the welfare of Estacada citizens that oftentimes its monthly meetings last far into the wee hours of the morning. Last Thursday's meeting was a bit shorter than usual but still quite comprehensive. Subjects for discussion ranged from finances to streets, to the water supply, to fire department, to police, to youth recreation, to liquor licenses, to property, to zoning, to sewers, and back again to finances. As one councilman said, "What is wrong with our town is that we haven't got enough money to run it on." So it seemed that this underlying factor colored many phases of Thursday night's meeting. There are so many pressing needs for our town for which money is required that these conscientious councilmen must surely acquire a few grey hairs at each meeting. A comment from Dave Horner expressed the attitude of most of them: "As a councilman you have to forget you're a business-man and consider every question in the light of the best interests of the community as a whole."

The councilmen present last Thursday night were Bob Clayville, Floyd Day, John Geil, Dave Horner, Tommy May, Mayor Ralph Svehaug, and recorder Bob Cooke. Also at hand as dependable consultant was the city attorney, John C. Caldwell. Listening attentively, from the far side of the room were the chairman of Estacada's Planning Commission, Dr. Alan Price, the town's chief maintenance man, Glen Ebert, and the chief of police, George Stevens, as well as a few other interested spectators.

At the close of the meeting, the Mayor announced that annual reports from each of the town's departments and committees should be presented, orally and in writing, at the January meeting of the Council. This will enable the council and townspeople to review the accomplishments of our town, in all its aspects, for the past year, and to determine more clearly its course in the coming year.

Refreshments were served by Ann and Lena Underwood, Erma Kiggins and Elizabeth Ames.

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
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Clackamas River Highway Dirt Slides Major Earth-moving Chore

Citizens Committee Recommends Tax On City Businesses For More Revenue

The citizens' committee of five, which reported from its investigations that the parking meter proposal was generally unpopular with Estacada business-men, presented to the Town Council, as a substitute means of revenue, the proposal of a business tax. George Kimmel, accompanied by L. L. Jenkins, represented the special committee, and requested further time for meeting with other merchants and councilmen in order to compile a more complete plan for this business tax. Included in this proposal is a special provision for the restrictive licensing of peddlers within the limits of Estacada.

Fire Department Has New By-laws

In order to clarify the status of the Estacada Volunteer Fire Department and to comply with certain legal requirements not heretofore covered, the Town Council last Thursday voted to approve the adoption of a new set of by-laws and constitution for the Dept. For the most part, the points covered herein are already in practice. The Department is composed of two companies of fifteen members each, or is not to exceed a total of thirty members. If a fireman misses a stated number of meetings his compensation insurance is dropped. The Council recommended that the Department submit a report of its current membership list at the end of each month, for insurance purposes. The fire chief is appointed by the Town Council, upon recommendation of the Dept. Due to absence of funds, the Council set aside any question of compensation for firemen.

Coach Jack McRaes Estacada Tigers split a pair of games on their home court this past week as they knocked over the team from Woodlawn Grade School 34-29 last Tuesday evening while dropping their opening game of the season to a rugged team from Gresham 33-23.

The B team under Herb Williams was defeated by the PAL club in the Friday opener 34-29 and on Tuesday played an intra-squad game in which one team, the Yellow-jackets rolled over the Panthers 33-19.

The Estacada Tigers in their loss to Gresham had a difficult time in getting their shots in and trailed at the half time mark 21-2 and were down 27-6 at the three-quarter break. Playing hard all the way, the boys managed to whip in 16 points the final quarter while holding their opponents to six, but the margin was too much to overcome.

Robin Cody, Ron Moore and Tom Curry led the Estacada scoring with 8, 6 and 4 points respectively while Jerry Clark and Gordon Kitching chipped in one basket apiece.

Scoring for Gresham were: Griesel 6; Larson, Sweaney, King and Cleveland 4 points each; Nolan 3; Parley, Robbins, Birdwell and Powell 2 points each.

In the opening game against the PAL Club, the JVs led throughout most of the game only to have the visitors put on a last quarter drive that netted them the victory. Paced by McLeod of the PAL team with 22 points which made the difference in the game, Loreng with 6 and Dungeon with 5 rounded out the scoring.

Scoring for Estacada were John Sanderson 13, Joe Reed and Earl Spink with 6 each, Charles Hamilton and Larry Bayne two points each.

By winning their game against Woodlawn last Tuesday, the Tigers evened up their early season record with one win and a loss. The game was nip and tuck all the way while the score tied several times and only a point separated the two teams. However, midway through the fourth quarter the local boys rallied to earn their first win of the season. The quarter score favored Estacada 8-6, but Woodlawn pulled ahead at the half 16-15, then at the three quarter break Estacada went ahead 26-25 and went on to wrap it up with a 34-29 victory.

Jim Keller paced the winners with 11, Dickie Beal 7, Ron Moore 6, Gordon Kitching and Robin Cody 3 each, Tom Curry and Denny Cheat-ham 2 points each. For the visitors: Tim 7, Dennis A and Bob L. 6 each, Roy and Don M. 4 each and Russell hit for one basket.

The second game was an intra-squad tilt between one team representing the Estacada Yellowjackets and they did battle with the Estacada Black Panthers. It appeared the Yellowjackets had more sting in subduing their counterparts as they led throughout most of the game and pulled away easily in the second half.

Big Danny Heiple and Jolt-ing John Sanderson hit for ten each; Ray Buser had 5, Jerry Broadhurst and Charles Hamilton hit 4 points each.
