Mr. Schadd says that in New Caladonia the deer are so plentiful that the government offers a bounty on them. He was sent to New Caladonia during the war for Typhoid, because there is a plant that grows there that keeps the mosquito

away, this tree has a bark that peels off like paper and some of the soldier boys used to write home on it. Their well meaning families sent so much stationary to New Caladonia that they had to stop it.

Mr. Schadd is also quite a musician and has written many songs. Mr. John McKenzie, sang the following three, accompanied by his wife, Gertie, on the piano. "My Own 'Tsu Love", "I'm Humming and Strumming (m troubles away)" and "May God Bless You, My Mother". They were very good and every one enjoyed the program.
