CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PRAISED

There should have been ten times more people at the City Hall Thursday night. It should have been a "packed house." The purpose of this meeting was to determine the best possible form of organization for the people of Estacada and the surrounding country could adopt to improve our community.

The talk by Mr. Leonard of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, left no doubt in the minds of those present that an active organization of everyone could be the answer

to our local problems now and in the years to come. Mr. Leonard had never been in Estacada before, but his appraisal of our problems, the same ones we have been discussing for the past six months, was remarkable.

He spoke of our resources, the possibility of us having new manufacturers of wood products and a great increase in agricultural production. His picture of our progress was optimistic, providing we worked for this advancement and were ready to receive and

encourage the coming of a great increase in population and income. This encouragement to locate here by large or small business would have to take the form of adequate housing, schools, churches, retail business houses, childrens activities and cultural activities.

One thing Mr. Leonard could not know. That is the tremendous Man Power, that we have here. Not man power, necessarily, in the sense of labor, but leaders in all branches of Education, religion, industry, agriculture and Local Government.

Our City Government-Planning Commission, City Council, Mayor, Recorder and other Departments are the best. For the past few months the same program outlined by Mr. Leonard, has been uppermost in the minds of these men. They have realized that economic changes were coming, and to meet them, city government changes were necessary.

The revision of old Ordinances, the addition of new ones, the sudden necessity for a good adequate water and sewer systems, the addition of sidewalks, curbs, streets, street lights, and the improvement of all city departments, has been discussed many of these improvements are already under way. The need for additional revenue is apparent, but the methods of acquiring revenue is a difficult problem.

The ground-work and planning, which has been organized by our officials will be most Chamber of Commerce program of city improvements.




