**Mt. Hood Highway
Forest Corridor
Named for Pioneer**

Signs marking the recently created "E. Henry Wemme Forest Corridor" have been installed on the Mt. Hood Highway, according to the Oregon State Motor Association. The Association suggested honoring the noted pioneer good roads enthusiast by the establishment of the memorial corridor.

The area designated as a memorial to the man who brought the first automobile to Portland in 1899, and who was the first to urge the development of a year-around road between Portland and Mt. Hood, extends from the east limit of Rhododendron to the foot of Laurel Hill. Part of the old Barlow Toll road is included in this section of the memorial corridor. Wemme purchased the road in 1912 and arranged that it be turned over to the state at no cost to be operated as a free public highway.

**Man-caused Fires
Hit 821 Past Year**

Man-caused fires in the forests of Oregon totaled 821 during the 1955 season, a figure somewhat larger than that of the previous year but still below the five year average of 885 fires, according to the annual report of the Keep Oregon Green Association which has just been issued by Executive Secretary Albert Wiesendanger.

The report points out that while the season as a whole was not too serious, still highly hazardous weather in late August and the first of September contributed to an outbreak of fires which resulted in considerable losses. However, the report points out that these were largely due to lightning.

The number of fires fought by the various protective or-

ganizations indicated that 445 were on lands under the administration of the State Forestry Department and its cooperating associations, 294 on the National Forests, 55 on Indian Reservations, 25 on Bureau of Land Management lands including grazing districts, and two on the Crater Lake National Park.

Public support of the fire prevention program and the success in keeping fire out of the woods has been due in a large degree to the efforts of Oregon's 117 newspapers, its radio and television stations and the support of the various county committees that have been set up under the K.O.G. program.

Wiesendanger pointed out that one of the important parts of the program is the Green Guard, the youth organization sponsored by the K.O.G. During the year of 1955, 11,757 youngsters

**Highway Travel
Hits All-time High**

If Oregon's roads seemed slightly crowded last year, small wonder.

An all-time travel high was scored in the state during 1955 when more than seven billion miles were tallied on streets and highways.

The figure, according to Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry, represents an increase of more than 292 million miles over 1954.

Highest travel month, which came as no surprise, was August when 731,349,872 miles were traveled. Next highest, each with more than 600 million miles driven, were the vacation months of June, July and September.

Travel in the state has shown a continuing increase in every year except 1953 since World War II ended. Mileage has leaped from the not quite three billion miles driven in 1945 to the 7,044,592,307 miles of last year.

Mileage is figured from reports showing the volume of gasoline diesel and other motor fuel sales.
