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Farmers Attention
The Social Security Administration calls our attention to the fact that many farmers in the low income bracket and ordinarily not required to file income tax returns are failing to meet an important requirement of the revised social security law that became effective with 1955.
All farm operators, having a net profit of at least \$400.00 during 1955,
must file an income tax return
for social security purposes, even though there may be no income tax liability. April 15 is the deadline for filing income tax returns covering the year 1955.
Farmers desiring specific information should address the nearest Social Security Administration District Office whose address is Pioneer Post Office Building, Portland, Oregon.

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
