Western states are planning some increase in fall-harvested potatoes but smaller acreages of early potatoes with California expecting a 9 percent cut-back in the early potatoes.

If farmers stick with present planting intentions and yields run average, the economists look for much better prices this summer than last, according to the current Oregon Farm and Market Outlook issued by OSC. Copies of the report, which also includes market outlooks for other farm commodities, are available at county extension agent offices.

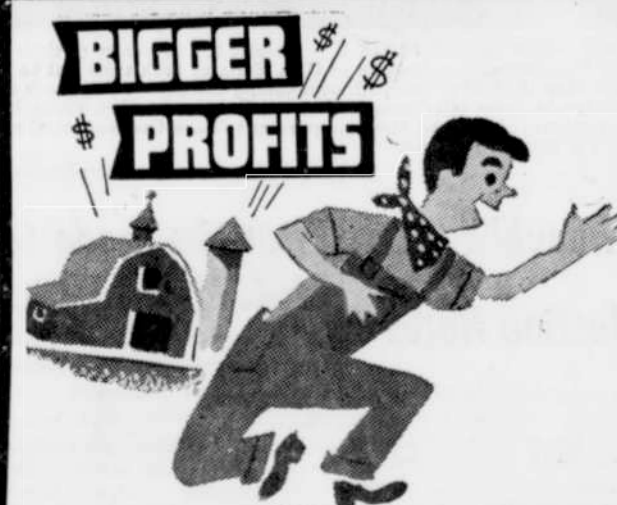
