It's A Wise Bride

A kitchen shower is always fun. But often the gifts are clever and pretty, rather than useful. So, for the bride who takes her cooking seriously, here's a list of "must" items compiled by Crisco Kitchens. They assume you receive an electric mixer, can openers, a rolling pin, a flour sifter, nested mixing bowls, a toaster, pans, skillets, an egg beater, and kitchen knives and forks as gifts.

If you didn't get yourself to the nearest housewares counter and stock up. While you're there, be sure to get unit measuring cups and a set of unit measuring spoons. You'll need them constantly. All modern recipes call for level measurements, and unit measures are accurate. Also, get one or two rubber spatulas. They're indispensable for scraping the last bits of food from dishes and pans, for scooping Crisco from the can for frying and baking, and for keeping the sides of your electric mixing bowl clean as you make a cake. Honeymoon Cake

2 cups flour  
1-1/3 cups sugar  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
Blend thoroughly by hand or mixer (medium speed) for two minutes.  
Then add:  
2 eggs  
1/3 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
Blend by hand or mixer (medium speed) for two minutes. Pour into 9-inch square pan which has been Criscoed and lined with heavy waxed paper. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) for 40 minutes, until cake tests done. Place mint patties on top and return to oven for two minutes or until patties have melted.

1/2 cup Crisco  
1 teaspoon salt  
2/3 cup milk  
Topping  
1 dozen chocolate covered mint patties (about 1 1/4" diameter)

We took in Frontier Days at Cheyenne. Enjoyed it very much.

We made a trip to the Blackhills of South Dakota and looked around Deadwood with high hopes of meeting up with Wild Bill Hickok and Calamity Jane. However we were due for bitter disappointment as we were told they had cashed in their chips a long time ago; and the same was true about old Sitting Bull. Next time we will brush up on our history before taking a trip.

We went over to Grand Junction and brought back a pickup load of peaches and pears. We went over by way of Trail Ridge Pass, elevation 12,300 feet and came back over Loveland Pass, elevation 11,500 feet.
