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GARDEN NOTES

Moderation is seldom Nature's whim. Sometimes we have an over-abundance of water in summer and a scarcity in fall. In the event the ground remains dry, don't forget to water (copiously) the evergreens. Rhododendrons in particular resemble a camel at this time of year; they require a store of water to draw upon against possible coming dryness and frost-bour upper soil.

The rose bug larvae finds a final application now of sulphate of iron most unpalatable. Mix it in well with the soil at the base of the plant at the rate of one tablespoon per bush.

If you are certain your peony clumps are in perfect health, it's a good idea to leave the foliage intact. If there is a question of blight (and it's a well known fact that this condition remains over the winter on old stems) be on the safe side and take precautions as follows: Remove soil carefully from around the crown and cut back each old stem as close as possible to the root, being very careful not to injure the dormant eyes from which new growth struts in the spring. Burn all refuse and scrape the top soil off and discard. Replace with fresh soil from some other part of the garden. These few simple steps will send the plant to its winter sleep with a clean bill of health.

Garden pests haunt old rotting vegetation this time of year. Thus a vigorous cleanup of sluch sources of food and lodging is in order to reduce the number of unwelcome tenants.

Two good reasons for placing sand around newly set bulbs: it prevents the bulbs from decaying by preventing moisture from collecting and its appearance warns the gardener when digging that a bulb is close by.
