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OFFICIAL OPENING OF SPRINGWATER HILL ROAD SET FOR SATURDAY JUNE 8

Saturday, June 8, at 2:00 P. M. will be a highlight in the history of the Estacada area and a tribute to the perseverance and persistence of the promoters of the easy-grade road up Springwater hill, along DuBoise creek.

Fred Bartholomew one of the long-time boosters for this new road has been in charge of the planning of the formal celebration of the road opening. This route was surveyed 20 years ago by the State Highway Department. Until 5 years ago the only progress made apparently was conversation until the State Highway Dept. took over and we now have the culmination of their fine efforts in this beautiful section of what is known as the Foothills Highway.

The program as planned will start downtown Estacada with a number by the Estacada Grade School band under direction of Joe Barr. The band will march out to where the new road begins to be there shortly before 2 P.M. Fred Bartholomew will introduce Johnny Carpenter who will be master of ceremony. The notables to be present for introduction and brief speeches will be Gene Huntley, director of personal and public relations of the State Highway Dept.; A. G. Skelton, division engineer; the respective mayors of Estacada, Molalla and Sandy; together with others. Mayor Weirich of Estacada will officiate at the cutting of the ribbon that will officially open the road.

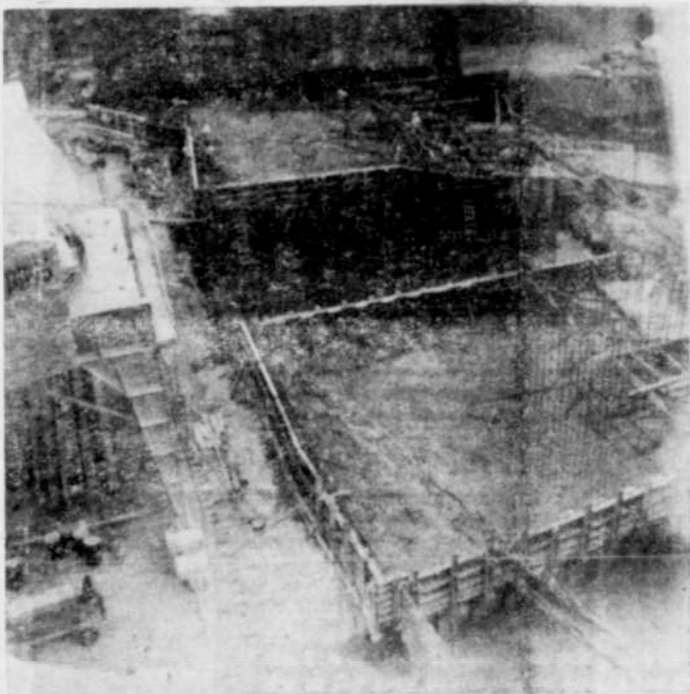
Rites for William L. FUCHS

Interment was at Willamette National Cemetery in Portland.

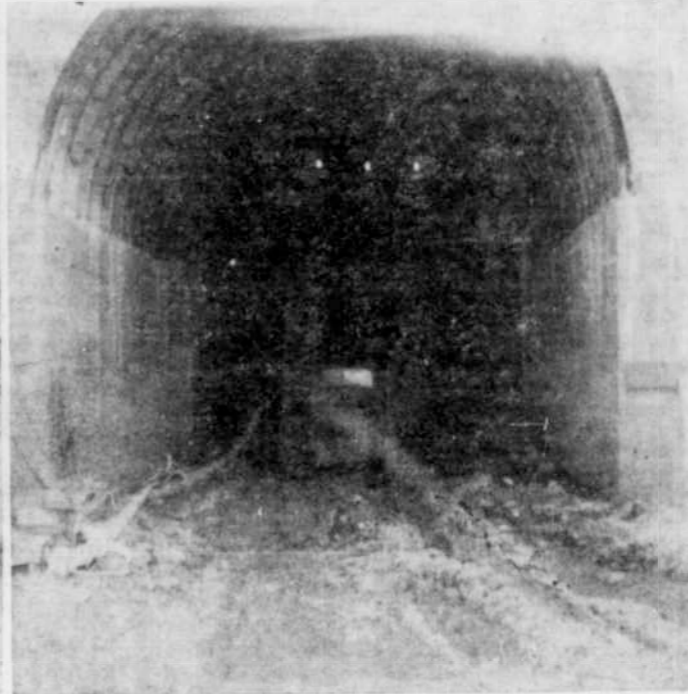

HUNT CLARIFIES WEED CONTROL

Dear Sir: There are a lot of misleading rumors about weed control in Clackamas County and I would like to clarify some of the false information as follows:

1. Is the Weed Control Program going to be enforced?
Answer: Yes.

2. Is the county going to do the spraying?
Answer: Only on County and Federally owned property, not on private land.

3. Did the Legislature appropriate a great deal of money for tansy ragwort control?
Answer: No. The Legislature appropriated nothing for this program.

4. Who will do the spraying since the County is not?
Answer: Each individual property owner will be expected to eradicate his own weeds. The County will enforce the law and give aid and assistance in the form of advice only. Also you may obtain information you need from the County Agent.

5. Who can I get to do my spraying?
Answer: Call one of the commercial sprayers, of which there is one in almost every section of the County or you may do it yourself.

All spraying of tansy ragwort should be done by this time but if the weeds have not been taken care of as yet they should be sprayed immediately as the tansy ragwort will be budding and blooming soon and will be much harder to kill causing a greater expense to the property owner.

The problem belongs to each property owner and the sooner each land owner with tansy eradicates this noxious weed, the sooner the County will be rid of the weed.

SCHOOL BOND ELECTIONS SET FOR MONDAY JUNE 24

The Estacada Union High School and Estacada Elementary schoolboard directors have been busy this winter and spring discussing the school needs of the two districts. It was decided by both boards that they would follow the recommendations of the Citizens committee off 22 lay citizens on a long range program.

The Citizens Committee recommended that the Union High School District sell the high school building and property except the stadium and football field and build a new high school building that would accommodate not less than 500 students. They also recommended that due consideration be given to using the grade school land that was purchased a year ago northwest of the high school building for a future high school building site.

With these recommendations in mind an appraisal was made by an unbiased appraising committee on the high school building and property not including the stadium or football field. The figure set was \$205,000.

Each board is following the Lay Citizens Committee recommendation by calling for bond issue elections for the people to vote on Monday, June 24th. Voting will take place at the Estacada Union High School and at the Estacada Grade School two to eight P.M.

The main purpose of the grade school election is to issue bonds in the amount of \$200,000 to acquire classrooms by purchasing the high school building. If the elementary school bond issue is passed and the high school bond issue to construct a new high school does not pass, the elementary school board could use the bonds to construct a building to house 8 or 10 classrooms. District No. 108 in Estacada is short 2 classrooms this year. It closed school this May with 681 students. It is estimated that over 700 students will enroll next fall with approximately 60 additional students each fall for the next 10 years. Which means two extra classrooms per year will be needed to keep up with the influx of children in the district. The high school building has 18 to 20 rooms that could be utilized for elementary classroom purposes.

The high school has 380 students this year and will have over 500 students within a 5 or 6 year period.

A proposal to add a 7 classroom addition to the present high school building was voted down in March, 1955. A proposal to extend the Union High School curriculum down to include the 7th and 8th grades for a Junior High School program was also voted down. A survey taken in 1955 at a public meeting showed that the majority of the people favored a plan of building a new high school rather than a junior high school or adding classrooms on to the present high school building.
