## Employment on Dam at 302

Work on the North Fork dam and Faraday hydroelectric plant addition of Portland General Electric company along the Clackamas river has reached the 10 percent complete mark according to L. J. Kelsh, PGE's resident project engineer.

An average construction force of 302 men was working on the project, which will ultimately add 75,000 kilowatts of capacity to the PGE system and Northwest Pool.

Concrete placement continues on the North Fork dam, where excavation for footings is now 86 percent complete. A total of 12,626 cubic yards of concrete has been placed. An estimated total of 85,900 cubic yards is necessary for completion of the dam, which is scheduled for trial operation in the fall of 1958.

One of the big operations in the expansion of Faraday capacity, boosting output from 19,000 to 44,000 kilowatts, is construction of diversion tunnel 2250 feet long and 23 feet in diameter to help feed the expanded power house. The tunnel, after delay caused by slides, has started to move through the rocky Clackamas river canyon. Tunnel work is progressing from the upstream end.

## Glen Park Opens New Street & Building Sites



Glen Park stands on his new mill access road at N.W. 5th and Wade streets recently constructed across the former Rynning property to the Park mill. Future plans call for the development of this 8 acre tract into 50 x 100 homesites to take in a six block area. At present, part of the tract will be used for lumber storage.

## Estacada Plug Set on KGW-TV for Friday, July 19.

On Thursday last the publisher of this paper spent the afternoon with Mayor Bob Weinrich and Recorder Bob Cooke at the studio of KGW-TV with their Educational Director, Helen Platt.

KGW-TV invited representatives of the City of Estacada to prepare a program and present it on TV show New Horizons, July 19th at 1:00 P.M.

This type of program is of the panel discussion series and usually uses 4 to 5 participants being questioned by a moderator. It is necessary for the City to pick its own moderator and develop the question and answer parts, paying particular attention to the informal discussion feature.

Estacada was selected from an article printed in the Clackamas County News February 1st, 1957, as an editorial. This editorial was a record of progress forwarded to KGW-TV at that time. ## Our Babe Ruth Takes 4 Straight

The Estacada Babe Ruth baseball team sponsored by the Park Lumber Co. won its 4th game in a row Saturday as they fought from behind to win a thriller from Oak Grove by a score of 8 to 6.

Oak Grove jumped to an early 4 to 0 lead in the 1st inning off strating pitcher Denny Cheatum. In the second frame Oak Grove had loaded the bases with a walk, an error, and a hit batter. Then with no one out Robin Cody came in from shortstop to put out the side, but not until two runs had scored on a sharp single to left field. Then in the 4th inning Estacada caught fire and piled up 8 big runs in that inning and the 5th. Everybody was hitting the ball hard and most of their hits were for extra bases.

After the first two innings the Oak Grove boys were held in check getting only two hits. The Estacada infield and outfield did a wonderful job to preserve the victory, catching almost everything hit their way.

Jim Donaldson, John Worley and Mike Newell each got a single and a double to spark the victory.

Jim Keller, Estacada's ace pitcher started the game at 2nd base. He will pitch the Concord game later this week. Concord beat Estacada 6 to 1 previously this year, so our boys will have to win this game to be championship contenders.

Under Babe Ruth league rules, one pitcher may pitch only one game a week. The schedule calls for two games a week per club. Coach Bob Cody's team lost the first two games of the season, but has come on strong and are now in 3rd place, winning 3 and losing 2.

The next home game for Estacada will be against Oregon City Saturday at 4 P.M.

Jim Keller hit a grand slam home run and pitched a one hitter against league leading Concord Tuesday eve, at Concord to win his game 8 to 1. Estacada has won 4 and lost 2 and are in 2nd place.

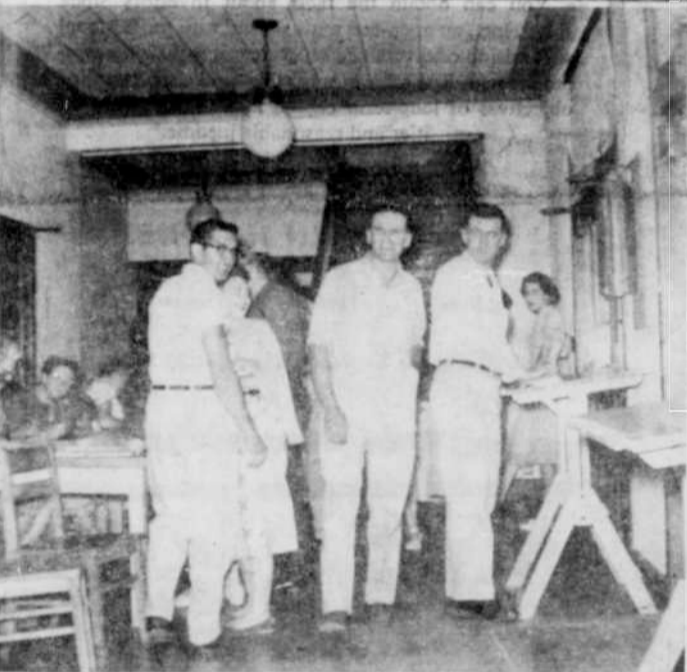
