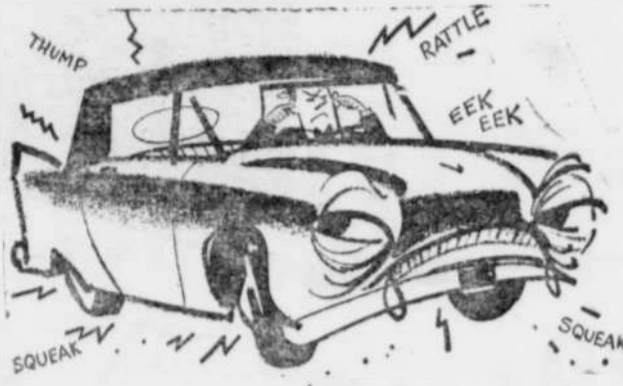
WORK DAY AT THE CHURCH OF GOD
