



A new transmission line, which will form a 'backbone' the length of Portland General Electric company's system, was announced Thursday as a major project for 1958 by PGE President Frank M. Warren, Jr. Rights-of-way for the new 230,000 volt line which will serve as an integrated part of the Northwest power pool grid through the Willamette valley are being obtained by PGE. The company plans to have the project, running from Troutdale to Salem, completed late in 1958. Designed to serve growing loads the line will form a strong tie through the middle of PGE's 2700 square mile service area. In the past 10 years PGE has added 66,205 custom-

ers to its lines. Since 1947 the company's average number of customers has jumped from 171,986 to 238,192. The new 'backbone' line will have a northern tie at Troutdale with Bonneville Power Administration, run to new Linneman substation west of Gresham and then over a 50-mile course to another new installation east of Salem. PGE has purchased a 40 acre site on east State street, 4 miles from Salem, for the line's southern terminus. The Linneman substation, where a 73 acre site has been purchased, will be shared with Pacific Power & Light company which will put some of the output from the Swift dam project in southwest

Washington over the 230,000-volt PGE line. The 230,000 volt line will be strung over H-frame structures with pressure treated Douglas fir poles from Linneman to Salem. In addition to the Troutdale-to-Salem project, Warren announced a transmission project which will carry energy from PGE's expanding hydroelectric facilities on the Clackamas river to a new substation terminus near Oregon City. Power from North Fork dam, now under construction on the Clackamas river east of Estacada, and the expanded Faraday plant, will flow over two 115,000 volt lines.
