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Important Junior High School Vote This Tuesday; Needs Estacada Votes

The Junior High program will be voted upon next Tuesday Sept. 24 from 2 to 8 P.M. Each elementary school of the Estacada Union High School District will hold an election in each building for the purpose of voting on the proposal to extend the Union High School curriculum down to include the 7th and 8th grades. This would mean that the educating of all the 7th and 8th grades of each elementary district would be the responsibility of the Estacada Union High School District. This election would be a step towards meeting the building problems of the school districts. If the vote is favorable to the proposal a bond issue election will be held soon to build a Junior High School building to house 7th, 8th and 9th grades or build a new high school and use the old high school building to house the 7th, 8th and 9th grades. Any person a resident of one of the elementary districts six months and registered 30 days is eligible to vote. There is no voting at the high school building Tuesday but ballots will be cast in each elementary district. A majority of the elementary districts must vote for the proposal as well as a majority of the total votes.
