The old photos were a popular feature and the litter bug display the small at the beginning ended up quite large by evening.



## North Fork Dam Passes Quarter Construction Mark

Portland General Electric's \$240,000,000 hydro electric project on the Clackamas River at North Fork dam and the present Faraday generating plant just east of Estacada has passed the quarter completed mark according to L. J. Kelsh the PGE resident engineer.

The 26 percent complete work was reached just under a year from the date of trial operation for the first generating unit at the 207-foot North Fork arch dam. Trial operation is scheduled for October 1, 1958.

With the diversion of the Clackamas river through sluiceways on the partially completed south bank half of the North Fork dam and the installation of a cofferdam across the northern half of the river canyon excavation work for the arch foundation could be essentially completed according to Kelsh. The next major stage of construction will be the placement of concrete on the northern half of the arch between the partially raised southern half and the spillway high on the north bank where concrete placement is 75 percent complete.

The average work crew on the combined North Fork-Faraday project was 539 men last week.

Herman and Florence Gohring came to Estacada in 1921 and he has been called the pioneer dealer of meats in Estacada; altho there were a few others before him; but Herman put in a well equipped market; was a good judge of quality meats and a competent butcher. Both Herman and Florence became identified with the business and social affairs of the town. Herman was a councilman and representative of Estacada on numerous occasions. Florence was prominent in social and fraternal doings because of her ability and willingness to do all she could for her neighbors and to promote the good of the town. A few months ago Herman lost his speech which handicaps him greatly but there are hopes he can be helped and likely cured of his affliction. Of course they have made many good friends during their 36 years residence here. Herman sold his meat market to Jake Penner now of Mt. Angel who added groceries to the business and employed all at one time the four handsome young men David Horner, Paul Beck, Walt Sagner and Melvin Whitrock who made a hit with the people especially the young ladies and it picked the cream of the crop got ready they picked the cream of the crop to marry.

The Estacada paper of Dec. 31, 1914 said that the next day Earl Day of South Estacada would take charge of the rural free delivery for Route 3, now 2 in place of Eugene Wooster; that Day recently passed the civil service examination with high honors and his appointment followed. Then the paper went on to say that "while people along the route will miss Gene's pleasing smile; Earl has one too." Earl was very well liked among his neighbors around his place just south of Estacada where he lived and raised his family. Earl's wife who shared his popularity is still living. She makes her home with their son Don who lives on Pierce street with his wife and two daughters. Kenneth another son resides with his family in Roseburg. Ruth whose last name is now Smith has been in California for 8 years with her husband and children. The Days have a family reunion every year at Thanksgiving time. Oral Stormer took over this route in the days after Day retired and did a very creditable job, like O. E. Syron, the present carrier is doing today.

Toughy Boyer is dead. After serving his master and constant companion Hank Boyer for 16 years; he succumbed to the evils of modernism and was accidentally struck by a car. Hank and Toughy were in the forest service at one time and saved each others lives several times among the dangers of the upper Clackamas water district some years back. Hank feels his loss very much and who can blame him at losing the companionship of the best friend he ever had.
