SIG UNANDER SEEKS GOP NOMINATION FOR GOV. IN MAY PRIMARY
 Sig Unander, Oregon's treasurer since 1953, announced on Tuesday afternoon that he will seek the republican nomination for governor in the May primary election.
 Unander, who received more votes than any other candidate in the 1956 general election, said his decision to run came "after long and careful study."
 "There are many considerations, including my family," he stated.
 Since he polled 416,410 votes in the 1956 general election, Unander has been prominently mentioned as a gubernatorial candidate. The Eisenhower-Nixon presidential ticket received 406,393 votes in the same election.
 The 44-year old member of a pioneer Oregon family promised to visit every section of the state—large and small—between now and the May election, and asserted that "issues, not personalities, will be emphasized in my campaign."

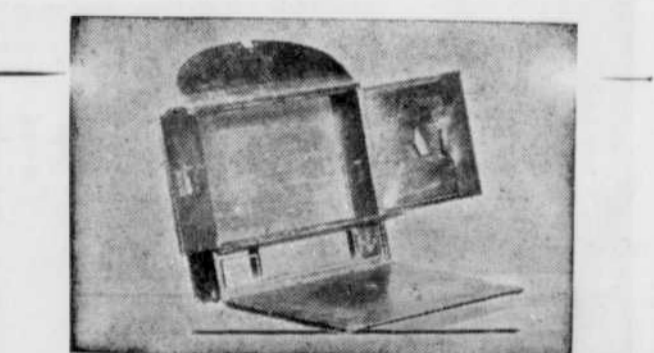

Who Owned This Writing Case?

CLUE: In the 1850's this case belonged to an army assistant quartermaster stationed at Fort Vancouver. Some years later, during the Civil War, this case was said to have held a checkbook with a balance of one million dollars.

ANSWER: Rufus Ingalls was the owner of this writing case. At the onset of the Civil War he was promoted to Colonel and assigned as Chief Quartermaster to the Army of the Potomac. Col. Ingalls was ready to leave Washington for Annapolis in order to accept and pay for 110 naval vessels to be used to transport McClellan's Army to Virginia. However, the battle between the Merrimack and the Monitor took place at this time, thus necessitating a revision of McClellan's plans.
