Rural Fire Protection Problems Focus on Vicinity Unprotected Rural Areas

Eagle Creek volunteers had their second opportunity to use the locally-housed fire-fighting equipment early last Saturday evening, when they responded to a call for help from the Bert Barnes place on Douglas Ridge (Rt. 1, Eagle Creek). Fire destroyed a small "berry pickers" cabin which was used as sleeping quarters for Mr. Barnes' brother Edgar. The firemen arrived in time to save numerous surrounding buildings from the fire, which was fanned by high winds.

This occasion brought to our attention a little-known fact, namely that there is a long section of territory, including the above area, that is not included in either the Boring or the Currinsville-Cazadero Rural Fire Protection Districts. In this case the Eagle Creek fire-truck (which is a part of Boring District) did answer the call as has the Boring truck on occasions in the past. The "unprotected area" to which we refer is bounded on the south (Currinsville - Cazadero) side by the Eagle Creek (or a section-line which closely follows the Creek,) and on the north by a fairly straight line running east (and west) from Eagle Creek Grange Hall. This "no-man's land" broadens as it approaches the Dover area. It also includes the major portion of the George district.

The rural fire department at Sandy will answer summons to a fire in any part of this extended area that is near enough to Sandy to be reached in a reasonable time.

In case of fire which seriously endangers timberland in any rural area the Clackamas-Marion Fire Patrol Assn. may be called. During the dry season
