NEW BAIT LAWS APPROVED FOR 1958 FISHING

A regulation banning all use of fish dead or alive for bait was adopted last Saturday by the state game commission. It was put into effect as a means of protecting trout lakes in central Oregon from introduction of trash fish.

Two exceptions were made to this regulation. Herring, candlefish, sardines, anchovies and cuttids, living or dead, may be used in coastal waters, and dead fish may be used for bait in Gerger, Dnews and Owyhee reservoirs, Klamath and Goose lakes, and in the main stem or flood plain lakes and sloughs of the Willamette and Columbia rivers and in the Snake river.

BOAT REGULATIONS

Here is a reminder of boat regulations enacted during the last session. The entire boating act related to boats under 26 feet and includes skiffs, canoes, rowboats sailing vessels and motorboats. Under the regulations all motorboats are required to carry at least one life or buoyant cushion for each jockey, life preserver, ring buoy, person aboard. In addition, a fire extinguisher, fully charged and in good condition, must be part of the boat equipment.

At night, motor boats must have a white light aft visible for a distance of at least half a mile and light showing green to starboard and a red light to port, both for a distance of a mile.
