**MID-SPRING SLUMP SEEN BY OSC FOR CATTLE AND HOG PRICES**

Cattle and hog prices appear headed for a mid-spring slump after getting off to an excellent start in 1958, reports W. Y. Fowler, Oregon State college livestock marketing specialist.

Liveweight prices for choice cattle that recently reached \$29 a hundredweight highest price since November 1952, are likely to drop \$3 to \$5 in April and May with some piling up of marketings. Fowler says cattle marketed in the next three months may also weigh heavier than usual.

The specialist looks for prices to recover slightly this summer but not back to present levels. Slaughter cattle prices next fall will be tied closely to pork supplies that are likely to be heavy, and to general business conditions.

Fowler says 1958 looks like a record year for cattle feeding. Coupled with this is the prospect of considerable beef from

foreign countries arriving on West Coast markets soon.

With large beef supplies tending to lower prices most profits in cattle feeding will have to come from weight gains rather than any price differential between feeder and slaughter grades the specialist explains.

Meanwhile, the present build-up in cattle numbers appears headed for a cutback with fewer beef cows and heifers on U.S. farms than a year ago. Fowler believes the down trend is likely to continue for a year or two, level out and start up by 1960 or 1961.

Hog prices will probably hit a high, the specialist reports. While pork prices may hold up better than beef this spring, larger marketings, heavier animals and lower prices are predicted for next fall. This is a result of a large spring pig crop throughout the nation and plentiful feed supplies.

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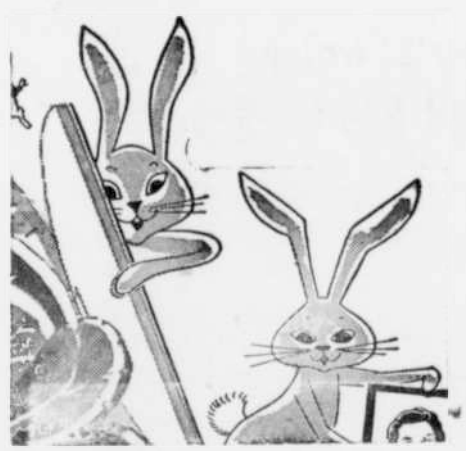
