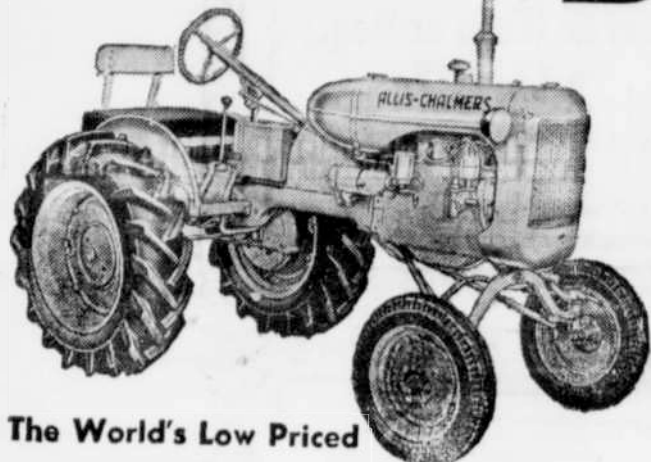

TONCA, A TALE OF THE FRIENDLY ISLANDS

All who have at - sometime longed to 'get away from it all'

on a Pacific island will find this a warm and sympathetic story, full of descriptive glimpses into the lives of the truly friendly people who inhabit these obscure islands.

The author and her doctor-husband have found their paradise there; and the story includes their meeting and ensuing romance, as it is interwoven in-

to the fabric of island living. Of special interest is the wonderful reception given their baby daughter by their native friends.

The majestic Queen Salote, who first brought these tiny (often uncharted) islands to the public eye by her attendance at the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, is a powerful yet dem-

ocratic ruler, and the author's meetings with her and other members of royalty are most interesting. The social structure of the native people is complex, yet relaxed, and isolated by choice as well as geography. This is one group of islands where tourist trade is not encouraged, in spite of the fact that more hospitable people are nowhere to be found.

The natives regard their personal integrity and dignity as more important than money, an admirable trait, all too seldom encountered.

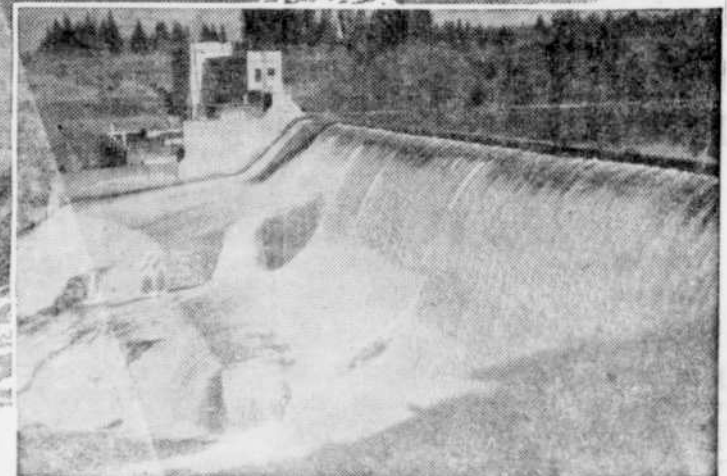

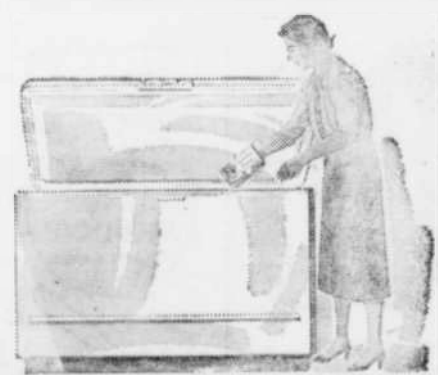
