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Timber Sales Planned for Benefit of Smaller Logging Operators Locally

Earl M. Karlinger, District Ranger of the Mt. Hood National Forest District announces the following program for timber sales on the Estacada district:

Approximately 72 million board feet of timber is planned to be sold on the Estacada District of the Mt. Hood National Forest during the 1958 calendar year.

To be sold before July 1, 1958: Rotten Bridge Springs 20 million board feet
Wanderer's Creek 17 million board feet
South Fork Ridge 9 million board feet
Lookout Springs 3,500,000 board feet
Misc. small sales 600,000 board feet

A total of 50,100,000 board ft. To be sold between July 1, 1958 and Sept. 30, 1958: Fish Creek Forks 18,000,000 board feet

Misc. small sales 2,500,000 bd. feet
Total 20,500,000 bd. feet
To be sold between Oct. 1, 1958 and Dec. 31, 1958: Misc. small sales 1,500,000 bd. feet
Grand total for 1958 is 72,100,000 board feet

Small Sales Program:
The Estacada District has a planned program which should enable the small operator to arrange his jobs in advance and allow him to bid on small sales as they come up.

Notice of these small sales will be sent to prospective buyers and notices will be placed in the window of the Estacada Ranger's office and Estacada office. The sale auctions will be conducted by the District Ranger in the ranger's office in Estacada at the time and date specified in the notice.

Schoolboard Association of Zone 5 Tells Plans for Junior High School

The publicity committee for the Schoolboard Assn., Zone 5, is continuing their work on the proposal for the establishment of a new Junior Hi for the Estacada High School district. There has been a great deal of planning and forethought given to the establishment of a Junior Hi vs. adding on to the present building.

It is obvious the most economical use of the tax dollars would be utilized in building a new High School Unit and converting the present High School to a Junior Hi. By adding additional class rooms to the present high school, the present shop and Ag. facilities would be over-loaded and would require additional construction. In this agricultural area in which we are situated, these two facilities cannot be over stressed. In order to properly balance the additions that would have to be made to the high school, the ultimate cost would approximate 50 percent of the cost of a complete new unit and would be filled beyond capacity by 1962, as our census of grade school youngsters shows, and there would be an additional increase of 100 students by 1964. The school census figures include only the students that are now enrolled in the elementary districts and do not take into consideration any who might move into the district or out. The general trend, however, is a rapid increase in population in the Northwest. The large corporations and utilities are gearing their operations for a 100 percent increase within the next 10 years.

The Association of School Boards with the Estacada Hi School District recommended the new unit be built on property now owned by the Grade School District 108 just a block north of the present Hi School. This area contains 24.37 acres more or less, and can be obtained for the amount paid by the Grade School District for that property. The proximity of this property to the present Hi School, with its auditorium and athletic grounds, made it seem more feasible economically by using the present facilities and reducing transportation costs to a more distant location. Other considerations are the water and sewerage facilities, etc.

The committee is planning to meet in the various districts and will have available information brochures for the public which will explain in detail the need for additional school facilities. All parents are urged to attend these meetings and express their desires and opinions, these meetings will be held in conjunction with PTA, Community, or Mothers Clubs, depending on which organization represents the individual schools.
