Notes by the Wayside

The following information came from Al Deggendorfer, Clackamas County Farmers Home Administration Supervisor. It will be of interest to many readers of this column.
"An expanded farm housing loan program designed to speed up farm building construction and improvement as well as providing an additional anti-recession measure was announced recently by A. J. Deggendorfer, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor, Chamber of Commerce Bldg., Oregon City, Oregon.
"Now an owner of a farm in agricultural production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities for sale or home use may qualify for the 4 percent long term housing loan provided he meets other standard eligibility requirements.
"Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.
"Borrowers may use funds to build, improve, or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings, and to provide water for farmstead and household use. Mr. Deggendorfer said that in addition to financing major farm construction, the loan funds can help meet many other needs for farm and home modernization such as adding bathrooms, utility rooms, better kitchens, and many other improvements to the home as well as to farm buildings. While tenant and farm laborers are not eligible, the owner may borrow to do construction work or make improvements for them.
"The loans are made to farm owners who need credit to finance building improvements or repairs, but find that adequate credit is not available through banks or other regular credit channels. The interest rate is four percent and loans may be amortized over periods up to 33 years."

Each year sees an increase in the number of farm ponds in the county. Incident to this increase are inquiries concerning the raising of tiny ray fish including bass, bluegill and crappies and about bullfrogs and ducks. There are inquiries also about trout which are not inclu-
